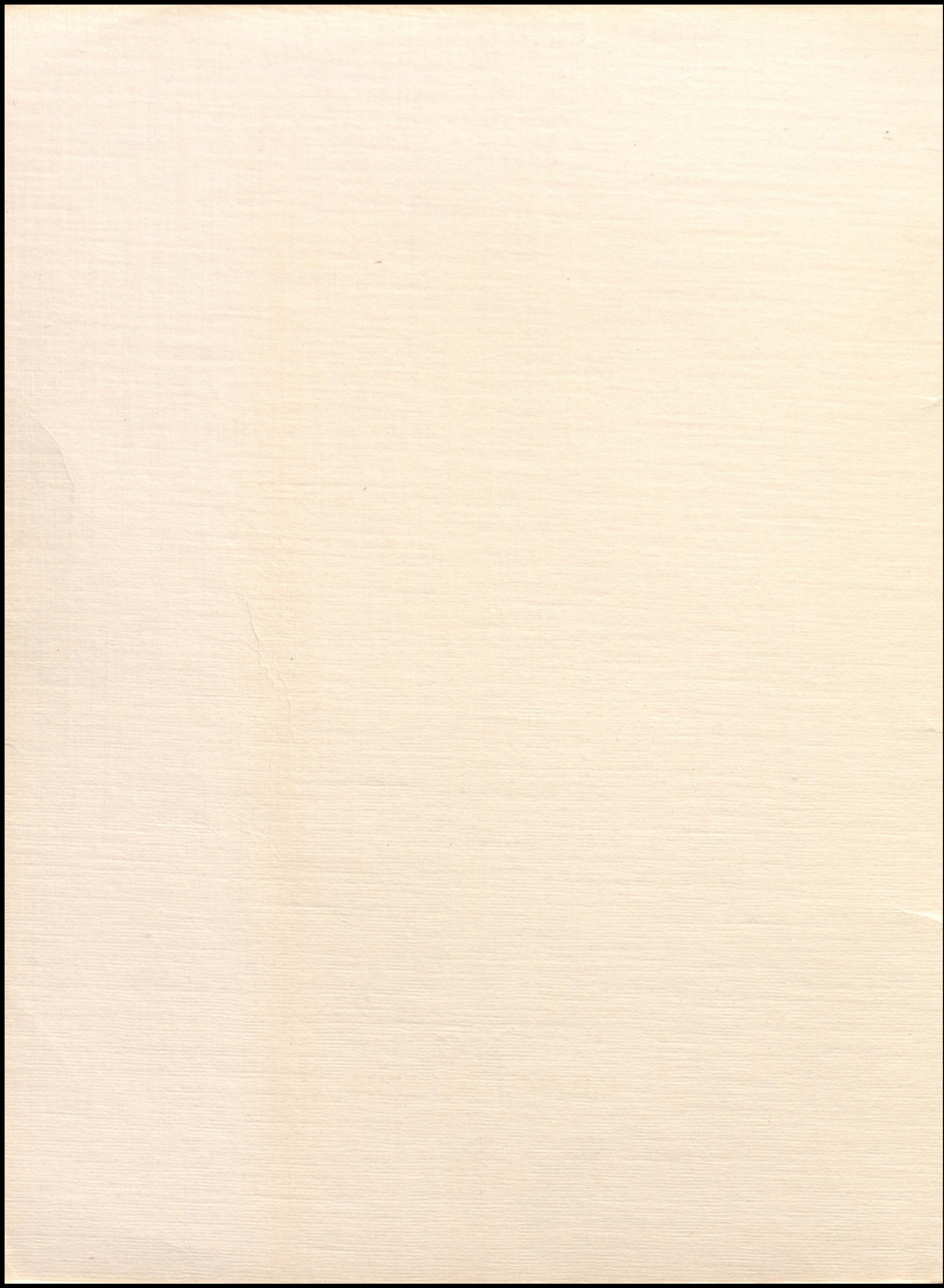

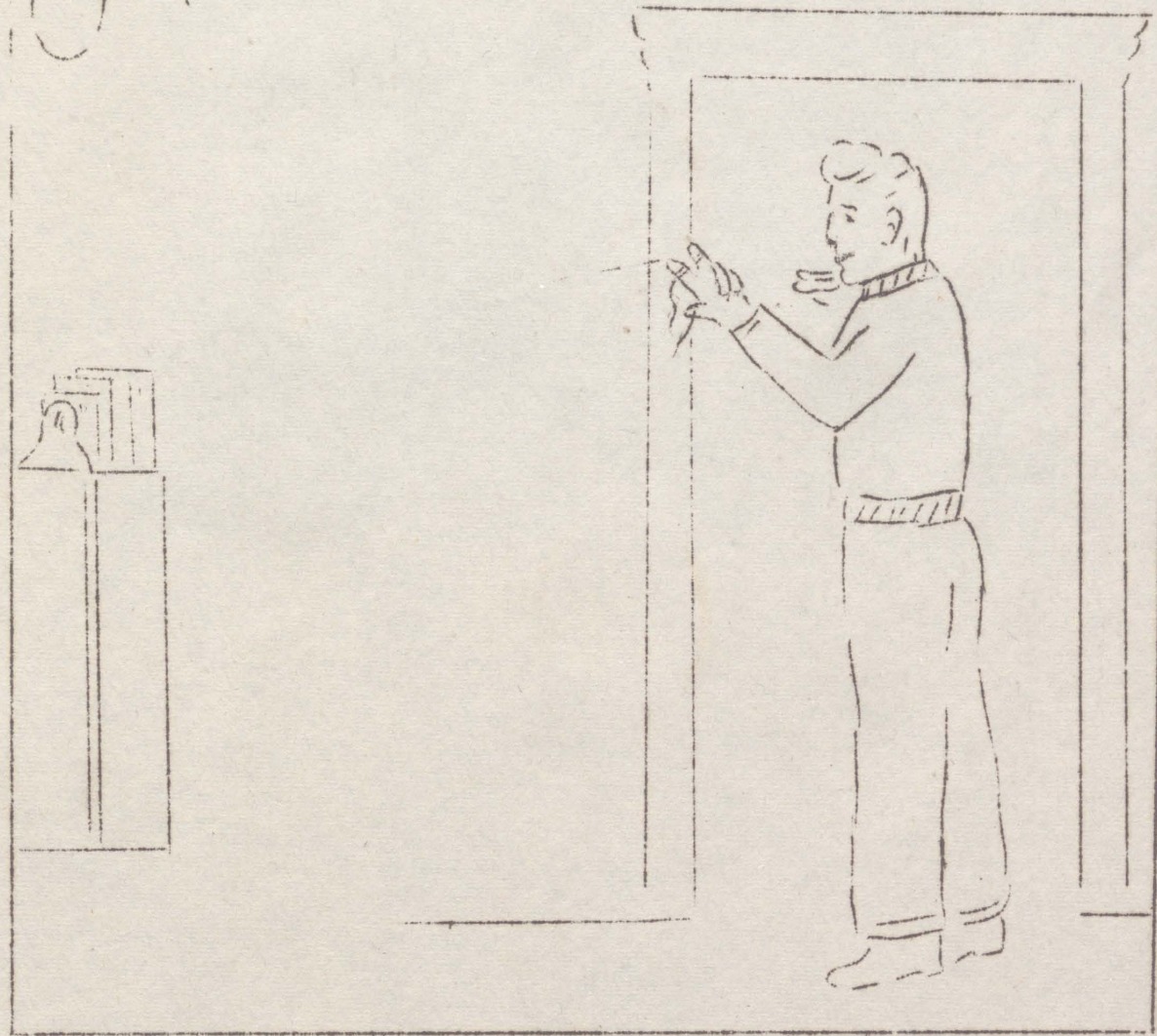
Due to the great success of year books in the past years, we, the Seniors, decided again to publish this edition of the Granite City Chips.

We elected the following as our class officers; Miriam Harley, President. Ruby Mattison, Vice President. Beatrice Coble, Secretary and Jack Stirk, Treasurer.

On the 13th of October, the same year, the freshmen were initiated into the mysteries of High School and its books.

Some of the students failed to like the trip and soon drooped off at one of the Air Ports along the way. They were Jack Stirk, Warren Svenson, Dale Smith, Albert Van Kirk, Andrew Wolff, Violet Reoh, and Jounior Churchill.

The second year we again left port with Mr. Keating as our Head Pilot. Miss Nelson left us and we took on a new Co-pilot, Miss Block. WE still had Mr. Haberkorn as the other Co-pilot.

We had the opportunity to initiate the Freshmen class this year.

Some of the students who had stayed and liked it during the first year, soon decided that they did not want to go on to school or else went to some other school. They were Dolores Morse, Abram Morse, Mildred Scott, and Margaret Latterman.

Lela Downing and Lillian Hilsabeck joined the class of '42 to finish their high school course.

During the course of this part of the journey, we presented our Junior Class Play, "Look Out Lizzie". Those who took part were, Eleanor Dooley, Ruby Mattison, Dorothy Port, Lois Ozburn, Louis Young, Jack Downing, Arlie Johnson, and Walter Wallace. The play was directed by Miss Block.

We also presented the Leap Year Dance, Washington's Ball, and the Junior Prom and the Senior Farewell Dance. Arlie Johnson was our Prom King and he chose Lela Downing as his queen.

The pupils who left the plane during the year were Arthur Hoyt, Everett Giguere, and Helen Anderson.

For the fourth part of our journey by plane, we again had Mr. Keating as Head Pilot and Mr. O'Brien and Miss Essock as Co-Pilots. Many times the trip became bumpy, but we always came out on top, which was due to the steady hands of our pilots.

Our Senior class officers were: Dorothy Port, President, Jack Downing, Vice President, Lela Downing, Secretary and Clarence Bolander, Treasurer.

We presented the play "No Bride For The Groom" during the year. 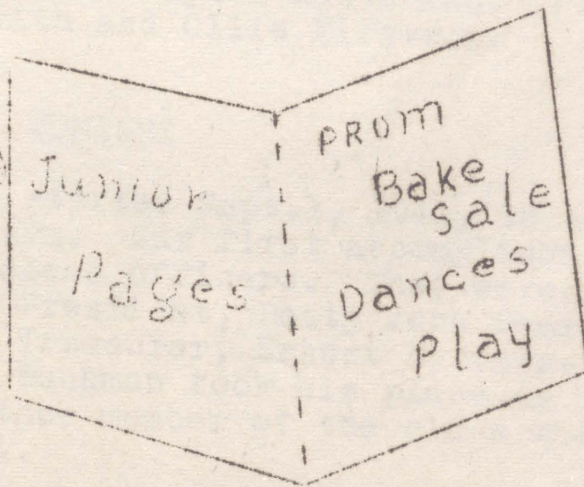

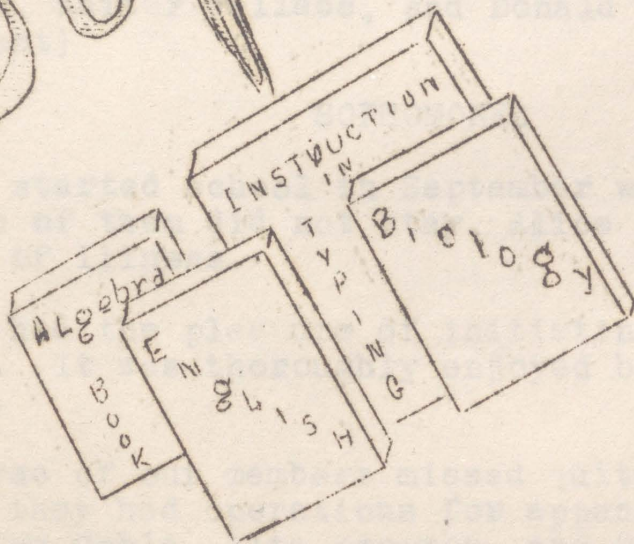
JUNIORS
