THINGS WE'D LIKE TO ALWAYS REMEMBER

The Junior Class play of '46 was held in April of 1946. The name of it was "Keep Moving" and it was a three act comedy. Miss Kuhn directed it. The members taking part were Wilma and Jack McTrusty, Whitey Roush, Dorothy Flom, Edna Bright, June Deau, Helen Wontor, Dick Holmes, Audrey Marquis, Richard Anderson, and Mervyn Pfeiffer. We never will forget the yellow tomato preserves that Mervyn found in June's basement.

After the Seniors of '46 graduated, the "new" Senior class gave them a farewell dance. Music was furnished by Jack Krummey's orchestra. A large crowd attended, and we all had a wonderful time.

The Seniors of '47 took an educational trip on Friday, October 18th. We first visited the Marinette County Normal at Marinette, and were shown through the building by Mr. Hocking, the principal of the school.

Our next stop was at the Marinette County Mental Hospital at Peshigo. Mr. Smith showed us through the clean and pleasant atmosphere of the wards and dormitories. Until this year of high food costs, the institution was self-supporting. The State pays \$2.50 a week for each patient, the other counties who have patients in the hospital pay a like amount. The men and women are separated in different wards, and such luxuries as tobacco and candy are furnished to the patients. We watched the patients, their care, their food, and came to the conclusion that Mr. Smith, the superintendent, is doing a wonderful job for the county.

In a smaller building next the main building was a home for the men who were pretty well cured. They could come and go as they pleased, and they read good magazines and daily newspapers.

The last building we visited was the home for the feeble-minded girls. They were very child-like, even though gray haired. They have mental ages of five to seven years. As we left this building and the hospital grounds, we were thankful that we were us. Get it?

On our way from Peshigo to Green Bay, we stopped along the road and ate the lunch the cooks had sent with us.

Our third stop was the Green Bay Reformatory. We were admitted through two steel gates. There were three men sitting in chairs with their faces to the wall. These men were either waiting for parole, or for induction into the prison.

The first room we saw was the assembly hall. Here roll call is taken every morning and night. The men are then divided into their work groups and taken to their assigned tasks. Some work in the fields, the laundry, the tailor shop, cabinet shop, or car body shop. Others are in charge of cleaning the floors and walls. The prisoners are not allowed to talk to each other as they might plan to escape. We learned the guards are underpaid for the great risks they take, and that the average prisoner is 18 years of age.

The prisoners prepare all the food themselves, and they keep the kitchen spotless.

Church services of two denominations are held each Sunday, and while attendance is not compulsory, the warden explained that most men attend every Sunday.

Athletic events are held in the gymnasium, and outside teams are played. They have movies once a month, and music events whenever they can secure talent. They also have a band.

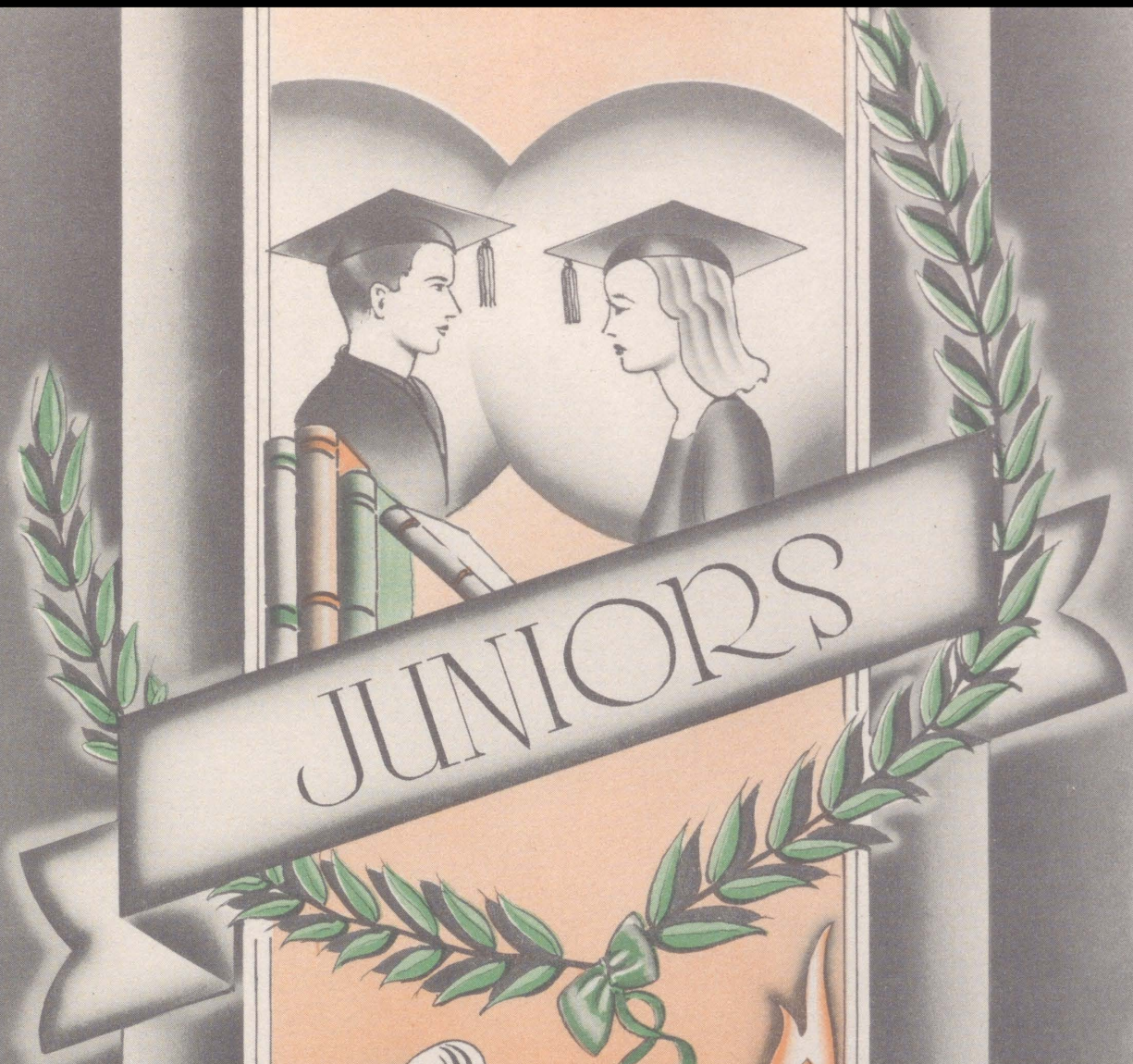
The reformatory is self-supporting, even to the new suit of clothes they give each prisoner upon his discharge. We were impressed with the youthfulness of the prisoners and with the cleanliness and beauty of the building and the grounds. We each vowed to ourselves that the only way we wanted to enter a prison was for a very short visit.

Our last stop was at the huge Public Service plant in Green Bay. We saw how electricity was made, and we saw furnaces that burn as much coal in one hour (600 tons) as our school burns in one year. The furnaces develop a temperature of 14,000 degrees!

The Public Service is building a five million dollar addition to its plant. It uses water from the Bay to develop steam for the house-size generators, and we watched the fish that come in with the water being screened out. One of our guides was June Weyercker's Dad.

We feel these trips are very educational and we hope the future classes at Amberg will always take trips of this kind.

Charles M. couldn't find his bottle in Math class. Some of us were wondering what kind of a bottle he meant until he said it was his ink bottle.

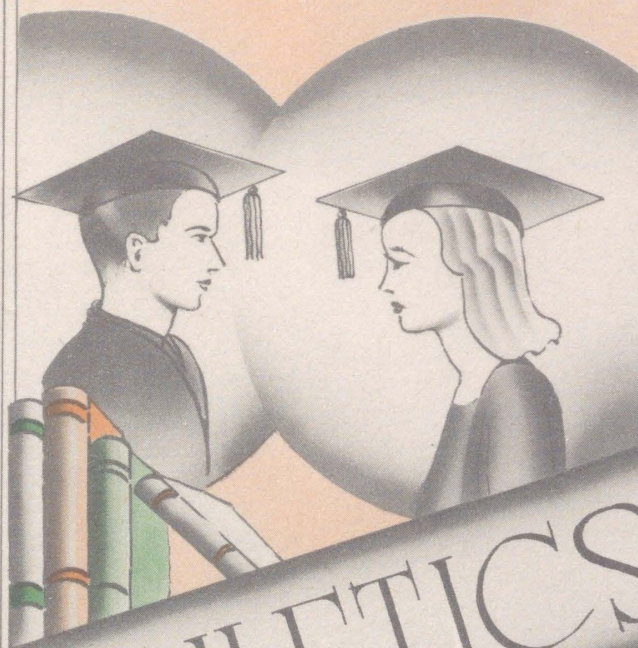
Mrs. Hill asked Richard A. what he planned on doing after he graduates. His answer was "Open the Door".

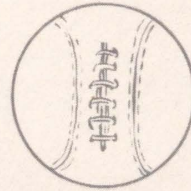

VOLLEY BALL

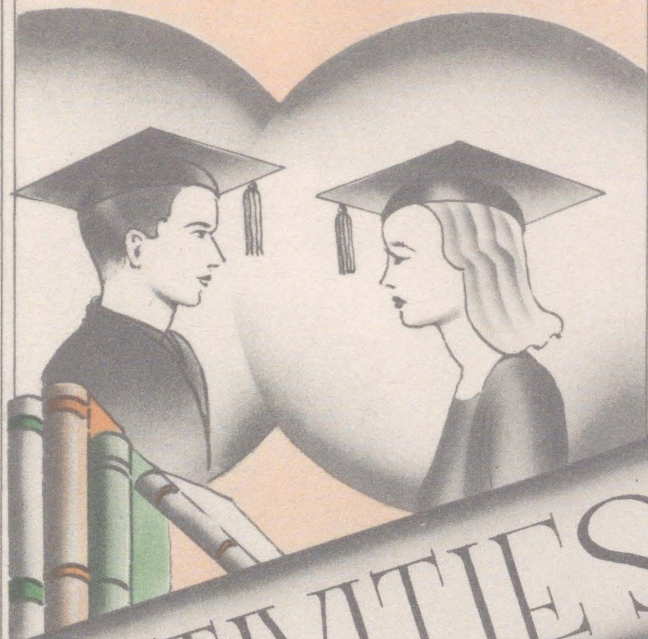
