On distant islands, Frank Beattie, Lloyd Kent, Edward Jossart, Maude Ozburn, Melvin Krumrei, and Laura Beyers were dropped off. Mr. Trapp was our captain. Other officers were Mrs. J.O. Hill and Miss Kuhn.

On our Sophomore journey Edward Wontor, Norman Krumrei, and Frances Harley took another boat. The captain was Mr. Trapp and the others were Mrs. J.O. Hill and Miss Kuhn.

The Junior year left us with six passengers when James Smiley and Kenneth Perry (who enlisted in the Army) hopped off. Mr. C.A. Krohn was the captain and Assistant Officers were Mrs. C.A. Krohn, Mrs. J.O. Hill, and Mr. John O'Brien.

The last journey on the U.S.S. Forever Amberg found Mr. Krohn as captain. Our other officers were Mrs. J.O. Hill and Mr. John O'Brien. When we looked around us we found only five passengers. 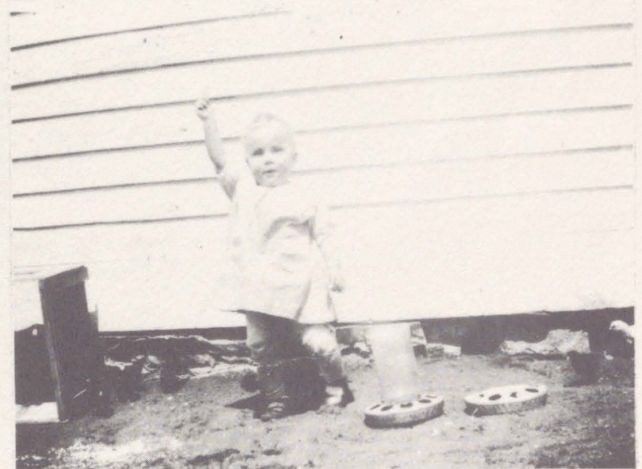

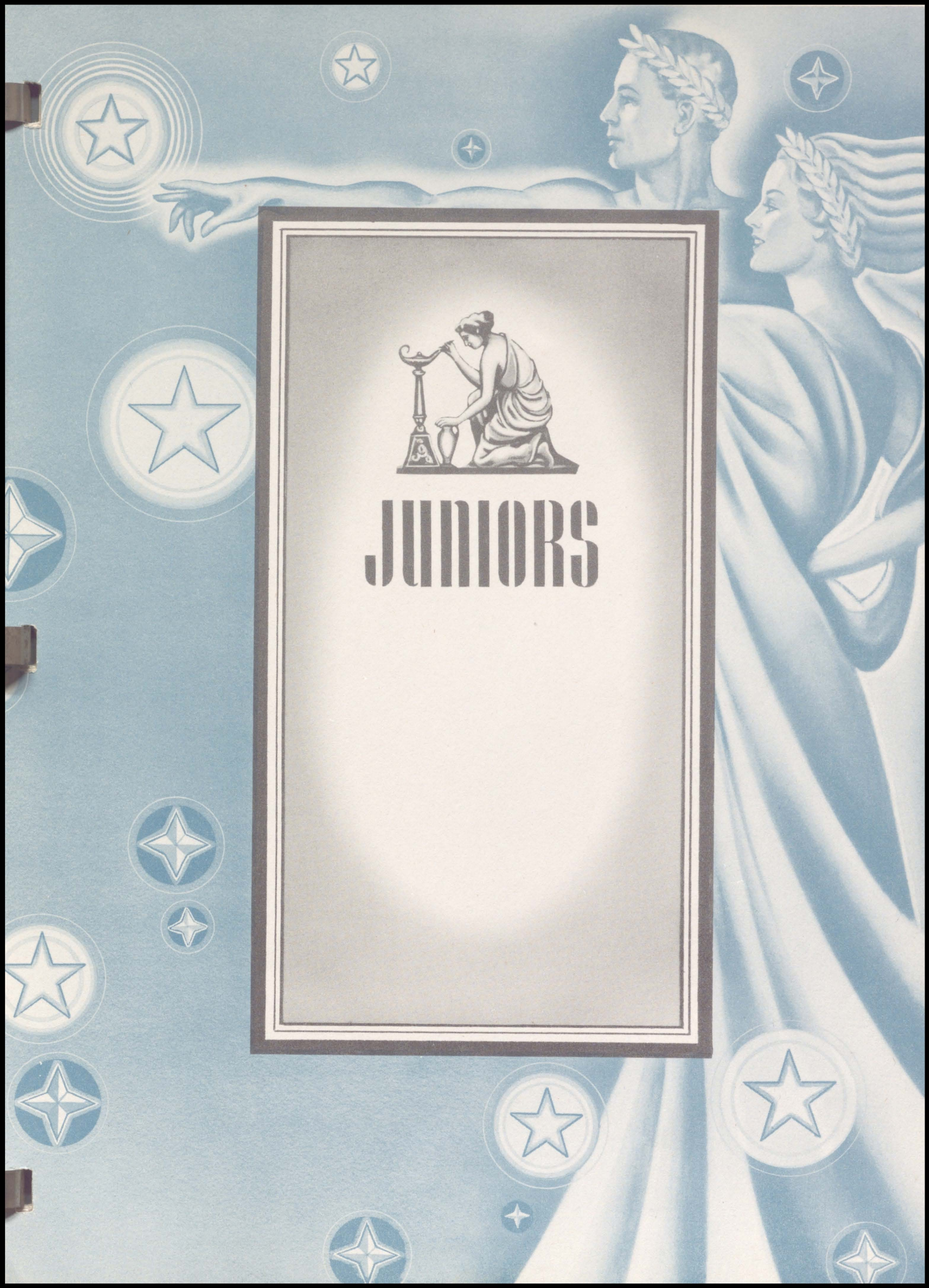

Junior Class History

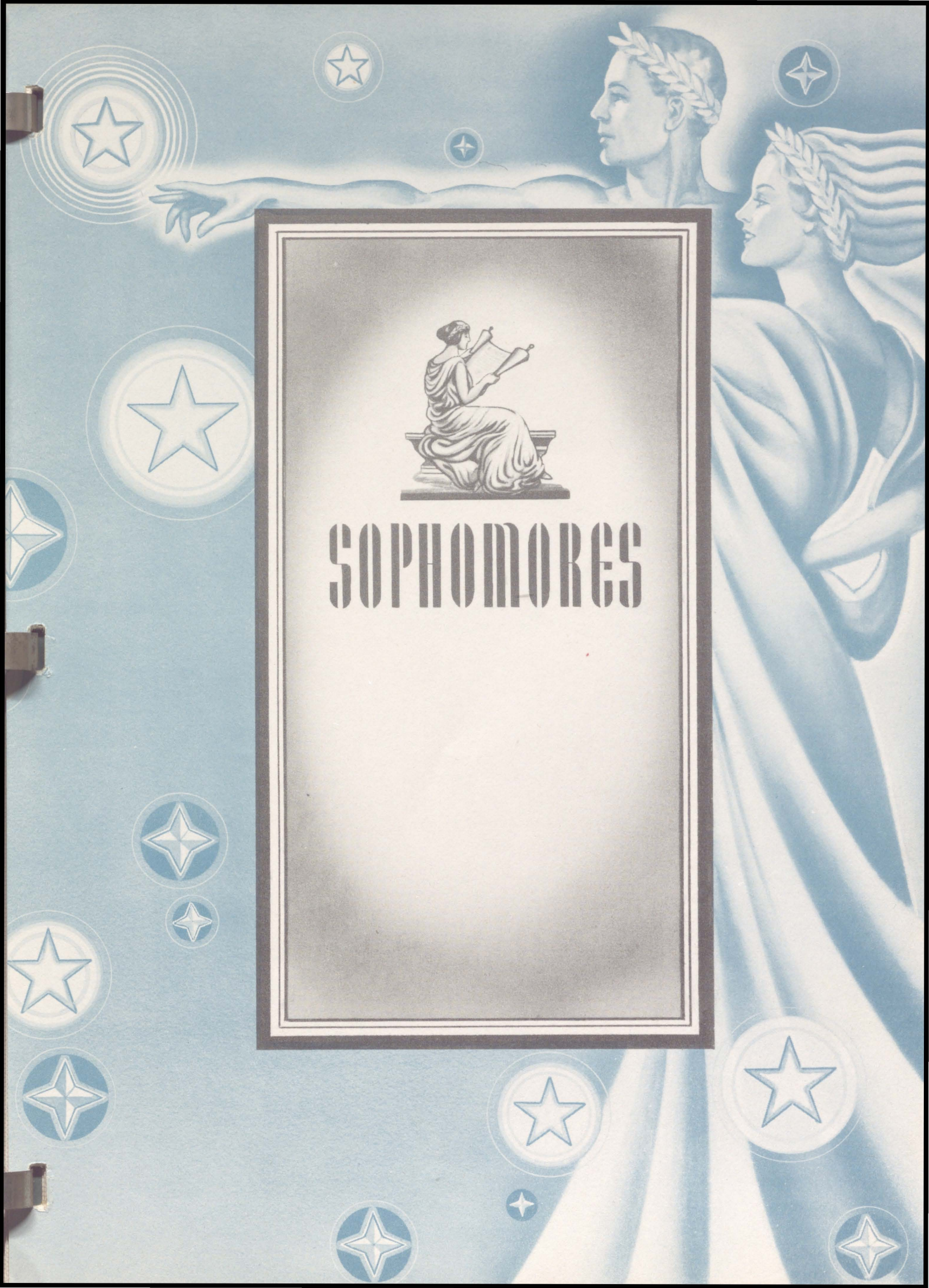
Charles Kingston is our class president, Clara Bolander is vice-president, and Audrey Anderson our secretary and treasurer.

As expected, our class came back this school year with one new student, Norma Stamper. Later on Russell Deau and Norman Pfeiffer dropped out of school.

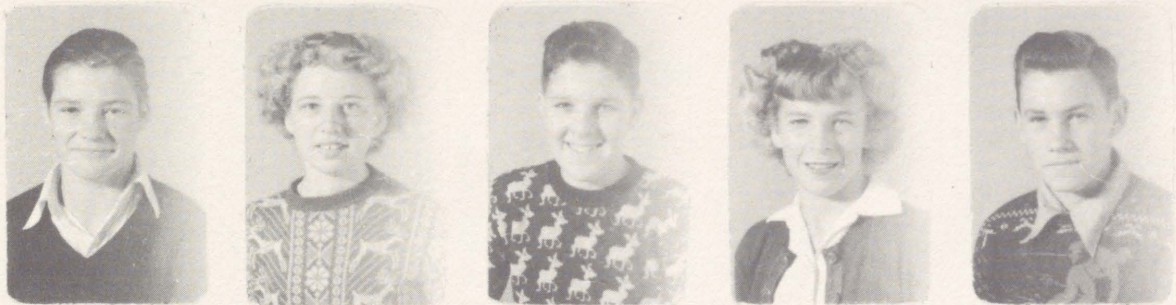
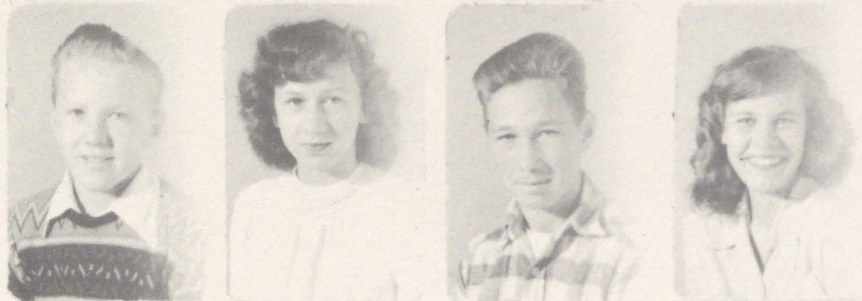

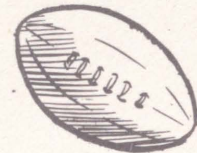
The record is one game won and one game lost to the Goodman "Wildcats", and a crashing triumphant victory of 20-12 over the Granite Valley All-Stars.

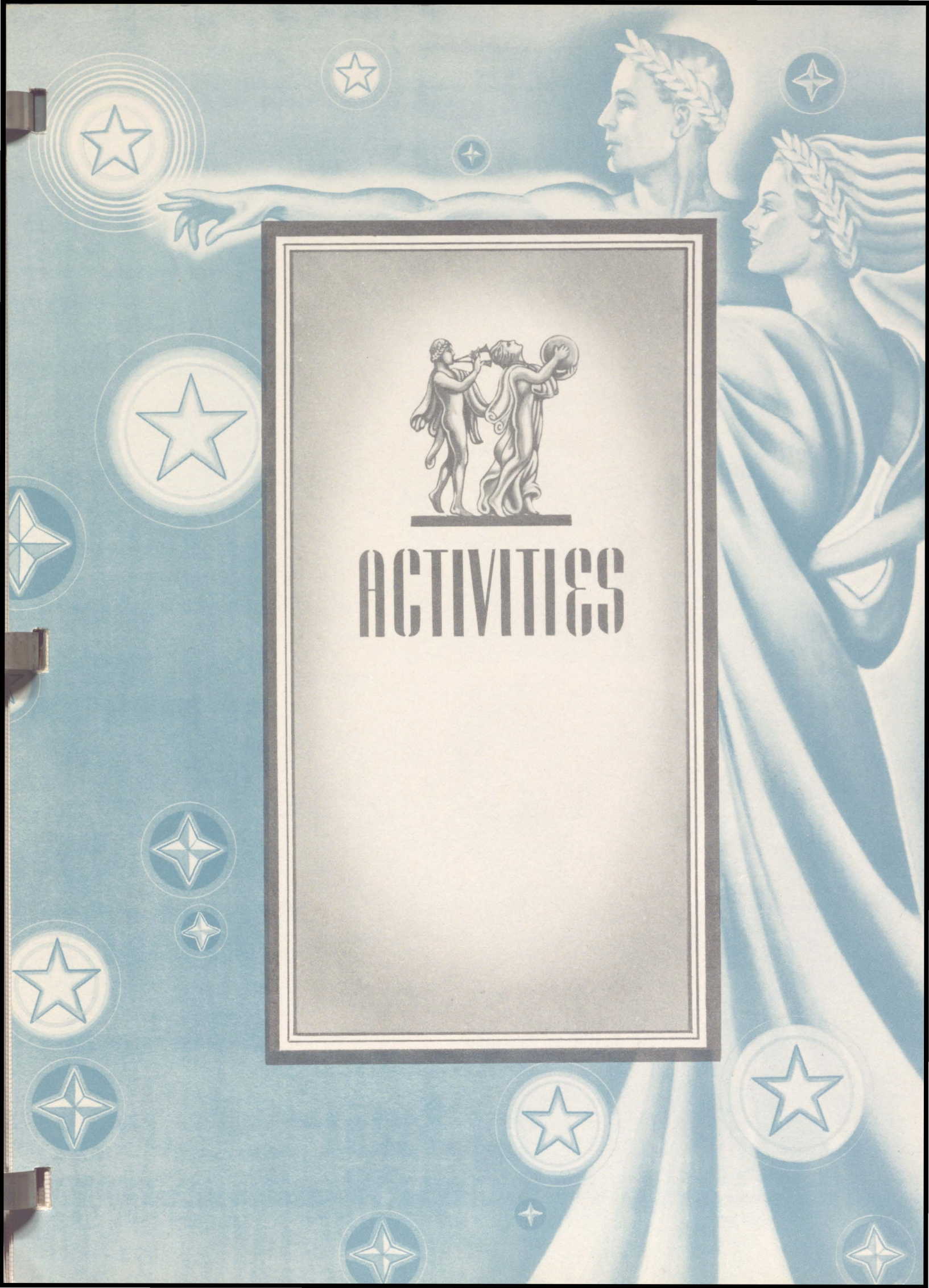
Football

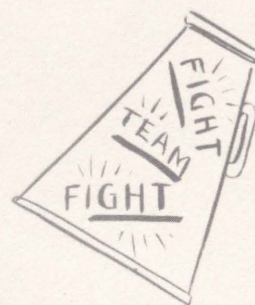

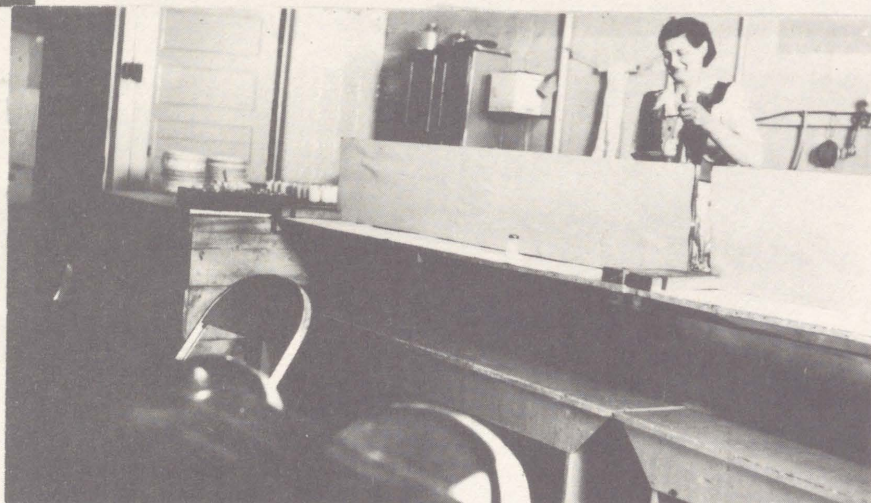

Barbara Claire McTrusty received an A at Kimberly and will be the first Amberg High student ever to go to Madison.



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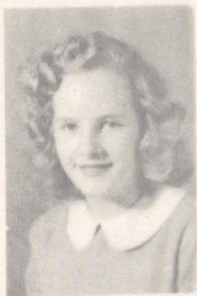
