Tim wills his ability to run the movie projector, along with Bob Deau, to anyone who needs a job and a good friend.

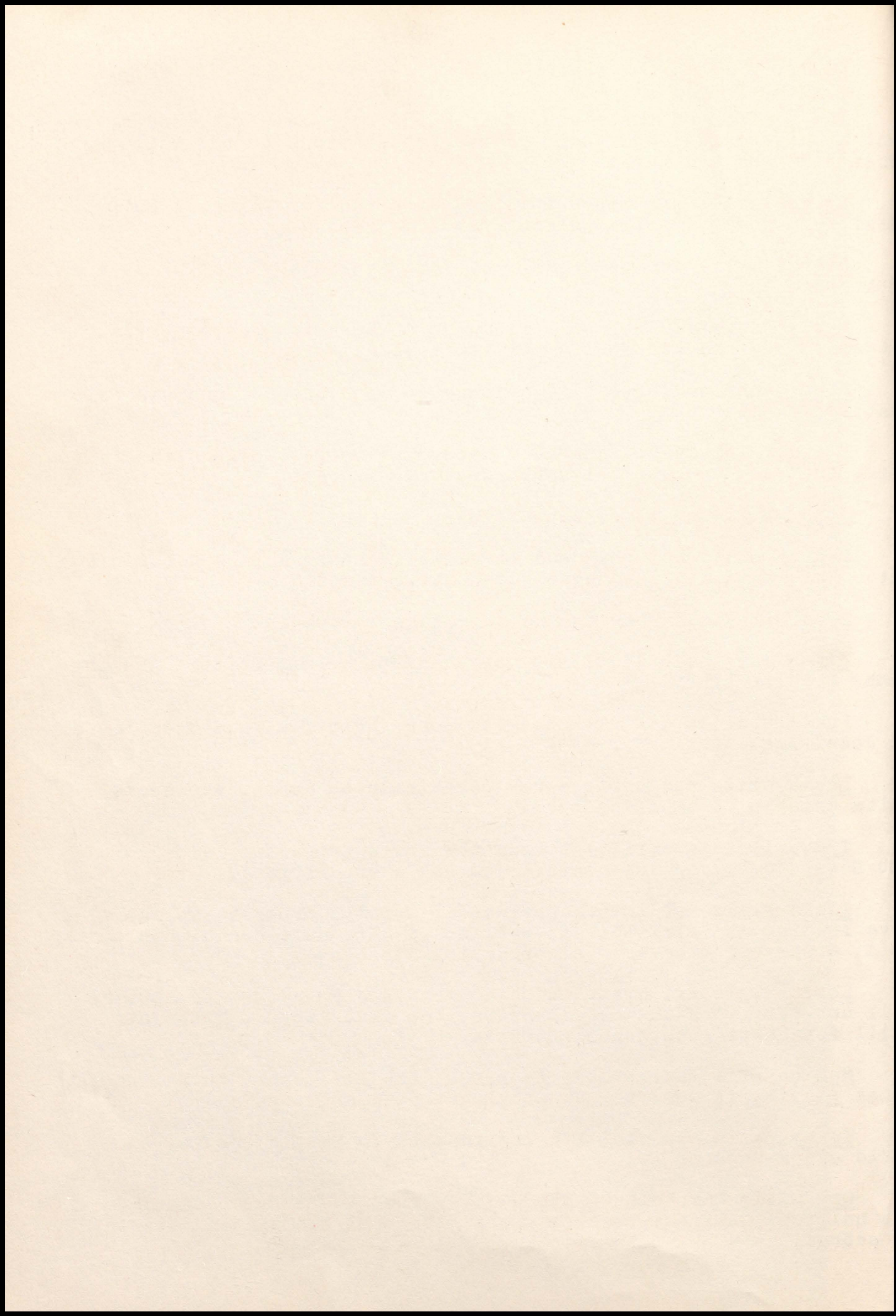

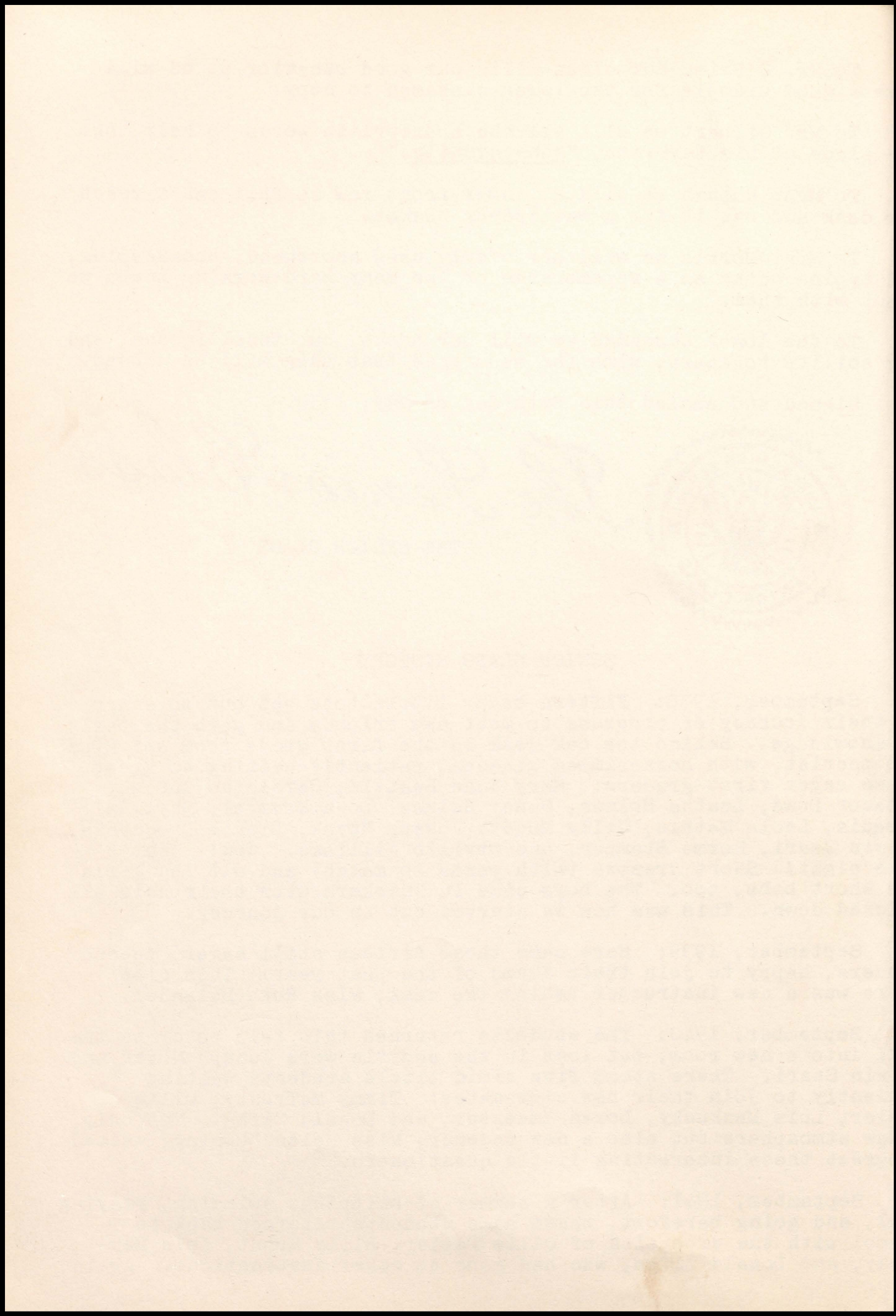
SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

September, 1938: Fifteen eager little tots set out to start on their journey of progress to meet new friends and gain the basis of knowledge. Behind the oak desk in the first grade room sat Miss Fae Andrist, with horn-rimmed glasses, patiently waiting to greet these eager first-graders: Mary Jane Beattie, Geraldine Coble, Eleanor Dowd, Leatha Holmes, Nancy Holmes, Dona Krumrei, Phyllis Marquis, Leola Mathis, Billy Mundt, Joseph Novak, Dickie Prochaska, Melvin Saari, Norma Stamper, and Orville Williams. Wow! What a cute sight! Short dresses (with pants to match) and all the girls had short bobs, too. The boys came in knickers with their hair all slicked down. This was how we started out on our journey.

September, 1939: Here came these fifteen still eager, second graders, happy to join their chums of the past year. This time there was a new instructor behind the desk; Miss Ruth Bolander.

September, 1940: The students returned this fall to cross the hall into a new room, but lost in the shuffle were Joseph Novak and Melvin Saari. There stood five timid little students waiting patiently to join their new classmates: Timmy McTrusty, Ollie Peeler, Lois Mankusky, Loren Smeester, and Donald Zifka. Not only a new atmosphere but also a new teacher, Miss Helen Downing, waited to greet these interesting little questioners.

September, 1941: After a summer of skipping, swimming, playing ball, and going barefoot, these same students returned back to school with the exception of Ollie Peeler, Billy Mundt, Lois Mankusky, and Donald Zifka, who had gone to other destinations. Again

new teacher, Miss Myrtle Lundberg, sat behind the desk to greet these yet eager students.

September, 1942: This fall the pigtailed girls and the bashful, tanned boys came back to school with a very eager air. They appeared to be much more important this year as they went to the second floor of the school building to be with the older students. Sitting behind the desk this time was a man teacher, Lawrence Hearty, who remained with us for half of the school year, until he was called Uncle Sam to fight for his country. We remember so vaguely the day that Mrs. Jeannette McTrusty took the position as teacher, not knowing how long Mr. Hearty would be gone. This year there were not only students who joined our class, but also some who left. Those who joined us were: Evans Newstrom, Claire Bolander, and Frank St. Vincent. Norma Stamper left us to go to Arizona, and Leatha Holmes moved to Milwaukee for an indefinite time. Frank St. Vincent also left in the middle of the year.

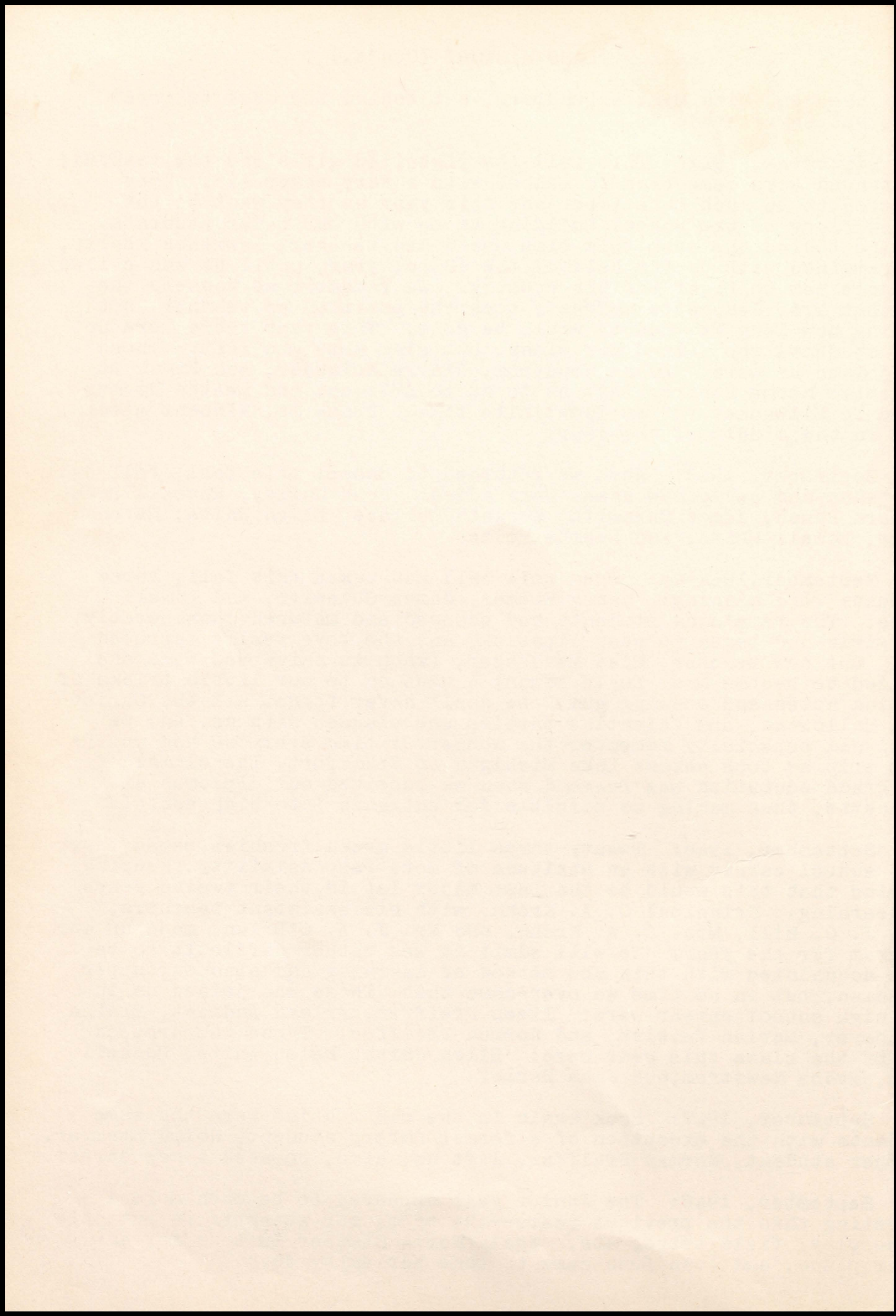
September, 1943: When we returned to school this fall, roll calls were taken and seven new names were added: John Harley, Russell Deau, Barbara Roush, James Suzawith, Kenneth Wallace, Ellen White, Helen White, Lowell White, and Leatha Holmes.

September, 1944-45: When roll call was taken this fall, three students were missing: Nancy Holmes, James Suzawith, and Lowell White. The remaining students had changed and matured considerably; the girls had begun to wear lipstick, and the boys really "spruced up". Our new teacher, Miss Messenger, (whom we shivareed when she decided to become Mrs. Doyle Downs) caught on to our little tricks of writing notes and chewing gum. We shall never forget all the Christmas, Halloween, and Valentine parties she planned with us, and we shall all especially remember the wonderful time everyone had on the last trip we took across Lake Michigan to Frankfurt. The climax of our grade education was reached when we received our diplomas at Marinette, thus making us eligible for entrance into high school.

September, 1946: Twenty-three little green freshies began their high school career with an attitude of more responsibility, keeping in mind that this would be the last major lap in their twelve years of learning. Principal C. A. Krohn, with his assistant teachers, Mrs. J. O. Hill, Mrs. C. A. Krohn, and Mr. J. A. O'Brien, made up our program for the year. We will admit it was rather difficult to become acquainted with this new method of learning and also our upper classmen, but in no time we over-came this. Those who joined us in our high school career were: Ileen Pfeiffer, Arleen Andrist, Elaine Glemeyer, Marian Vankirk, and Norman Pfeiffer. Those who dropped out of the class this year were: Ellen White, Helen White, Russell Deau, Evans Newstrom, and John Harley.

September, 1947: Back again in the old routine were the same students with the exception of a former Amberg student, Norma Stamper. Another student, Norman Pfeiffer, left us, also, to seek a new career.

September, 1948: The Junior year appeared to be much more interesting than the previous years--the prom, our attempts to put on a class play, field trips, etc. Again Norma Stamper left us for another place, and Joan Dunn came to take her empty desk.

September, 1949-50: Alas! At last we have reached our destination with a feeling that we have acquired the basis of our fundamental knowledge, and many possess the inspiration to continue this education in specific fields. Those who have completed this important phase of life are: Mary Jane Beattie, Claire Bolander, Eleanor Dowd, Leatha Holmes, Dona Krumrei, James Krumrei, Phyllis Marquis, Leola Mathis, Timothy McTrusty, Loren Smeester, Orville Williams, Kenneth Wallace, Arleen Andrist, Elaine Anglemyer, Marian Vankirk, Arleen Pfeiffer, and Joan Dunn. We bid fond adieu to the memories of our lower classmen, books, pencils, parties, field trips, marked up desks, and teachers of the Amberg High School.

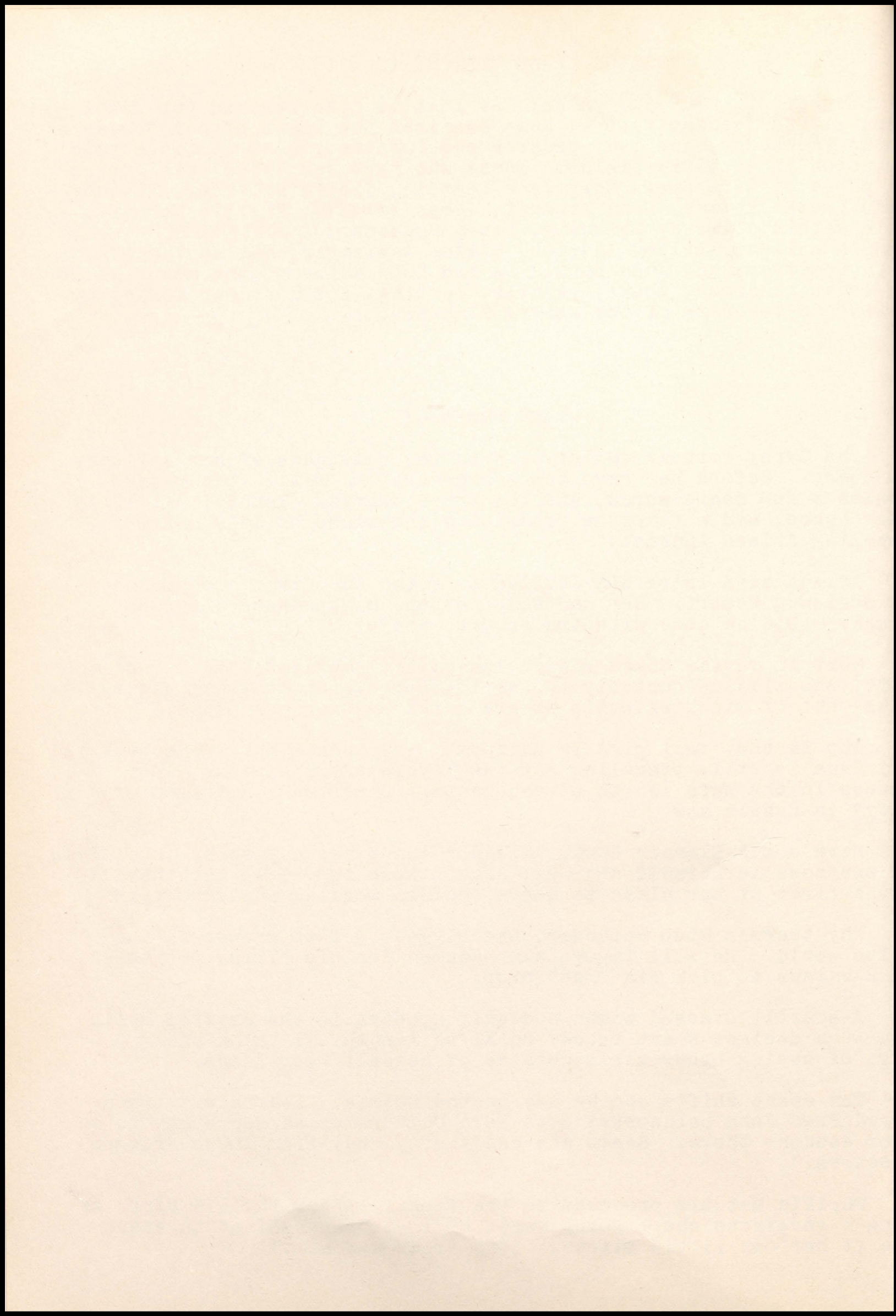

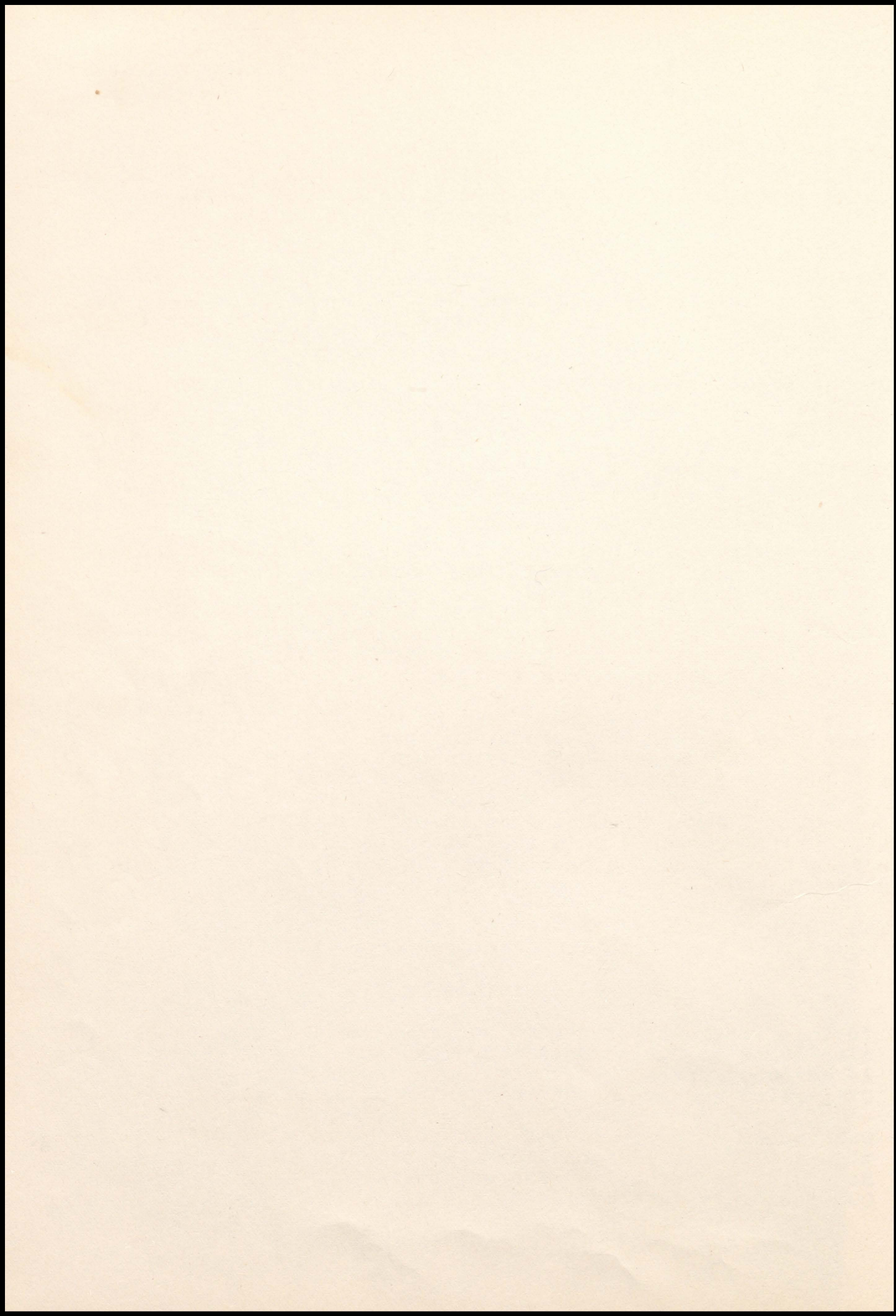
The "crystal wonder" emptied of all its brilliant contents turns once--then the curtain of darkness drops its fold.

Of parties and proms and the senior class plays.

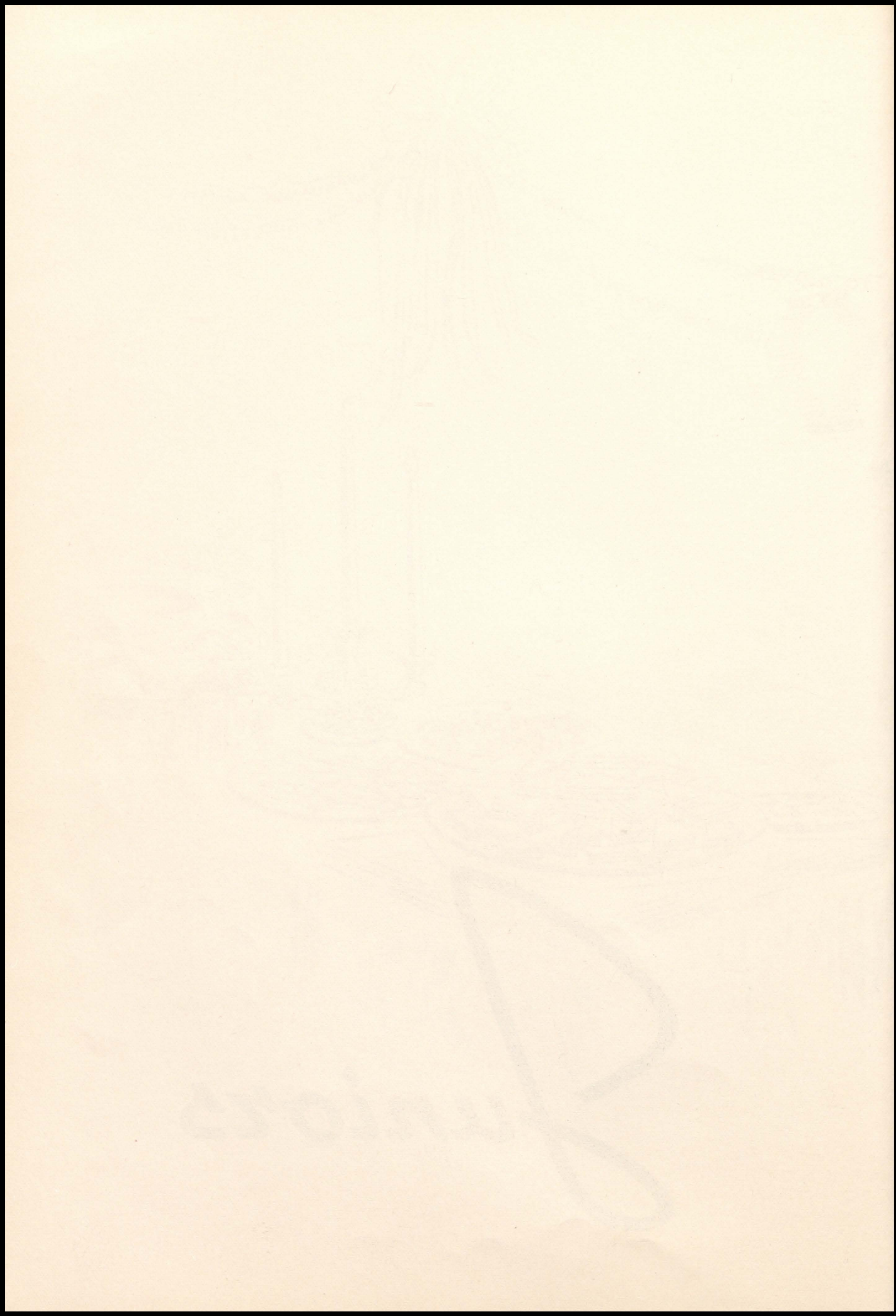

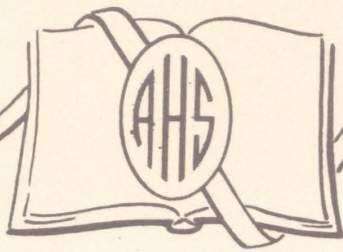

We received our class rings early in the year and were very excited over them. Everyone got the same type in either black onyx or blue spineli. The rings were quite expensive, but they are worth the money.

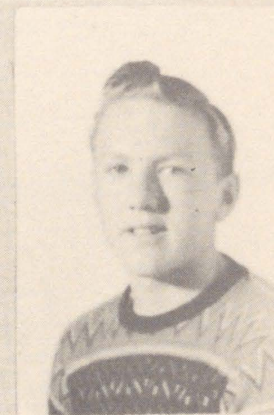
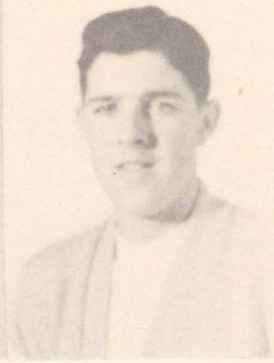
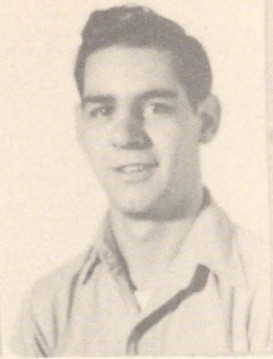
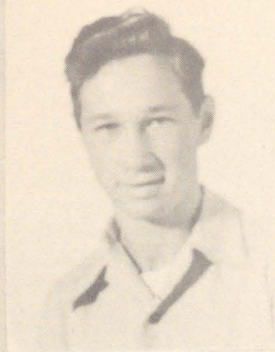

JUNIOR JAMBOREE

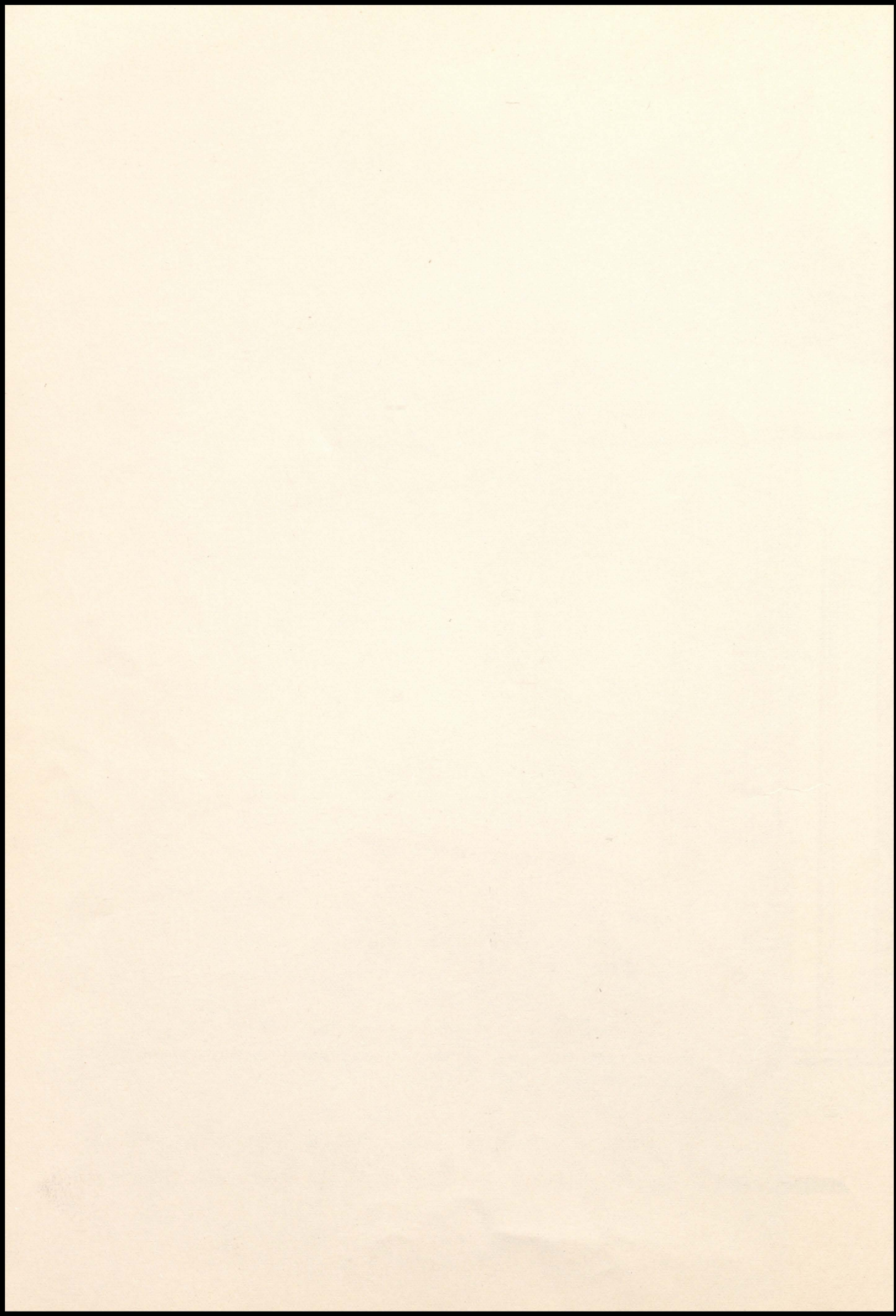

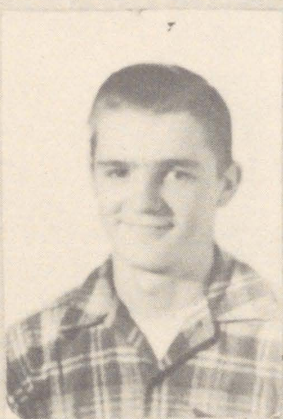

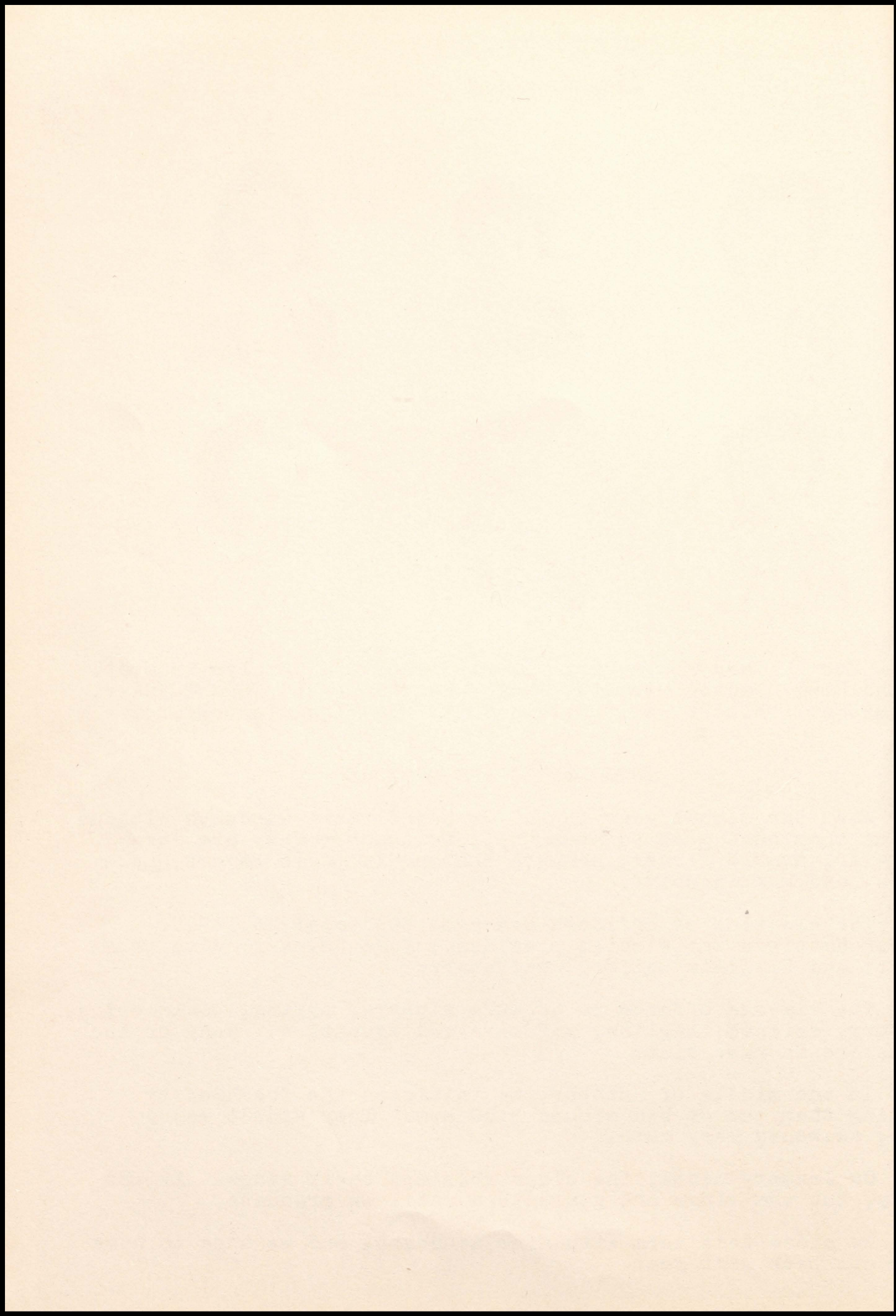
The election of officers was held September 24, 1949. Junior Mattison was elected president; June Weycker, vice president; and Virginia Wolford, secretary.

In the middle of October, we initiated the freshmen by getting them out of bed around 3:00 a.m. They didn't enjoy being awakened very much.

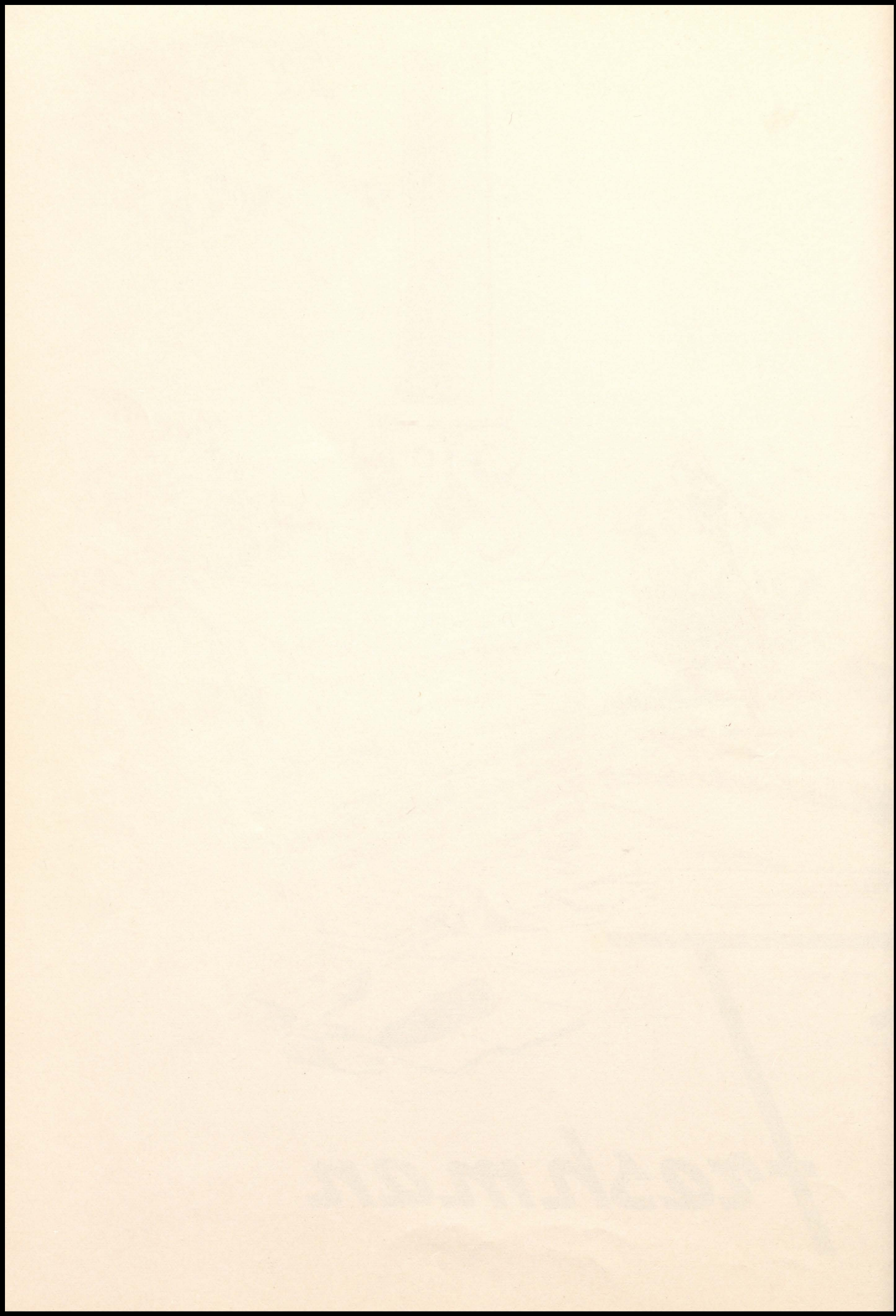
On January ninth, the class received their rings. It was early, but the rings are guaranteed until we graduate.

FRESHMAN RETURN PARTY

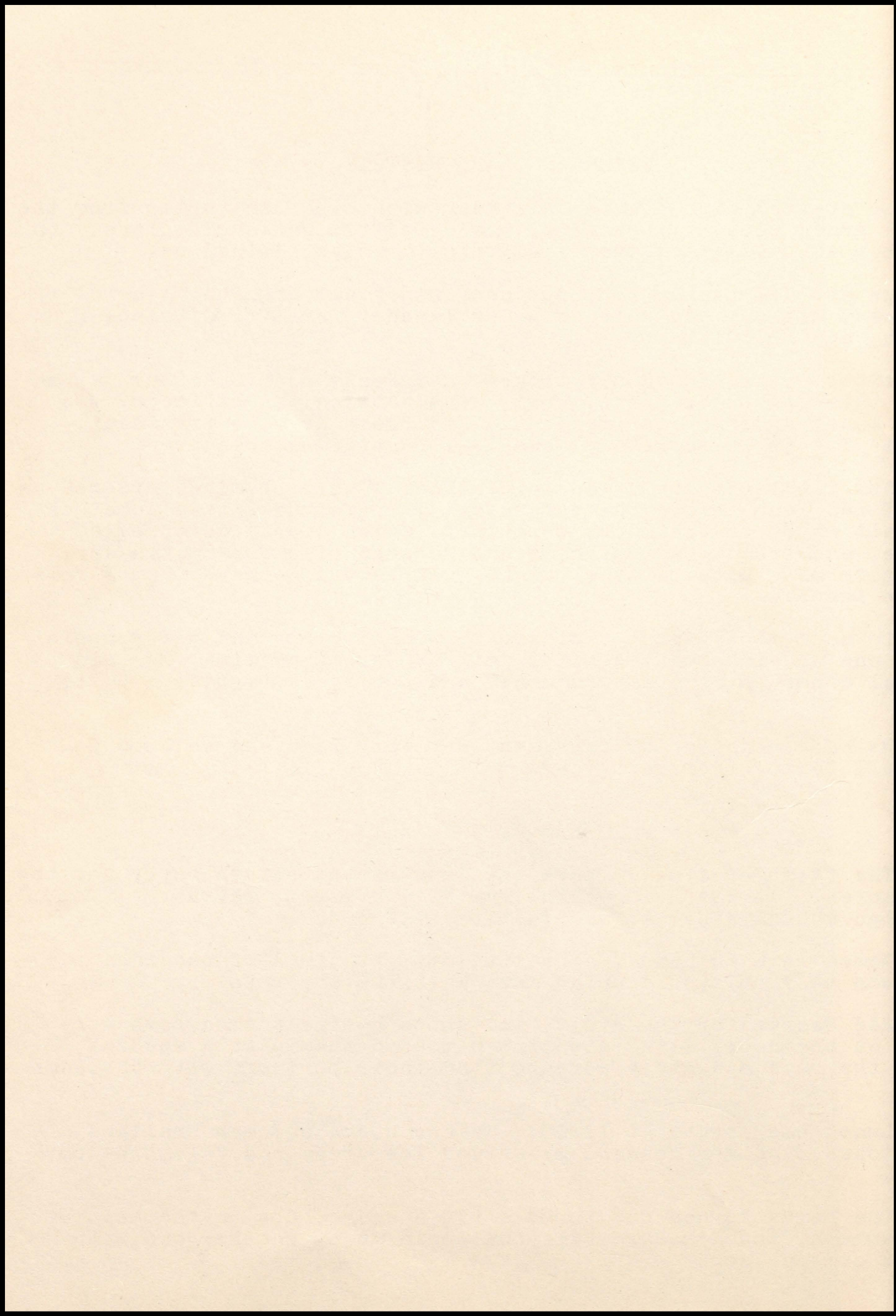
The freshman finally gave the long wanted Return Party for the sophomores. It was held at the gym Friday night, February 10, 1950. All high school students and faculty attended.

Games were on hand if the students got tired of dancing, but it seems they enjoyed dancing more with the shy boys.

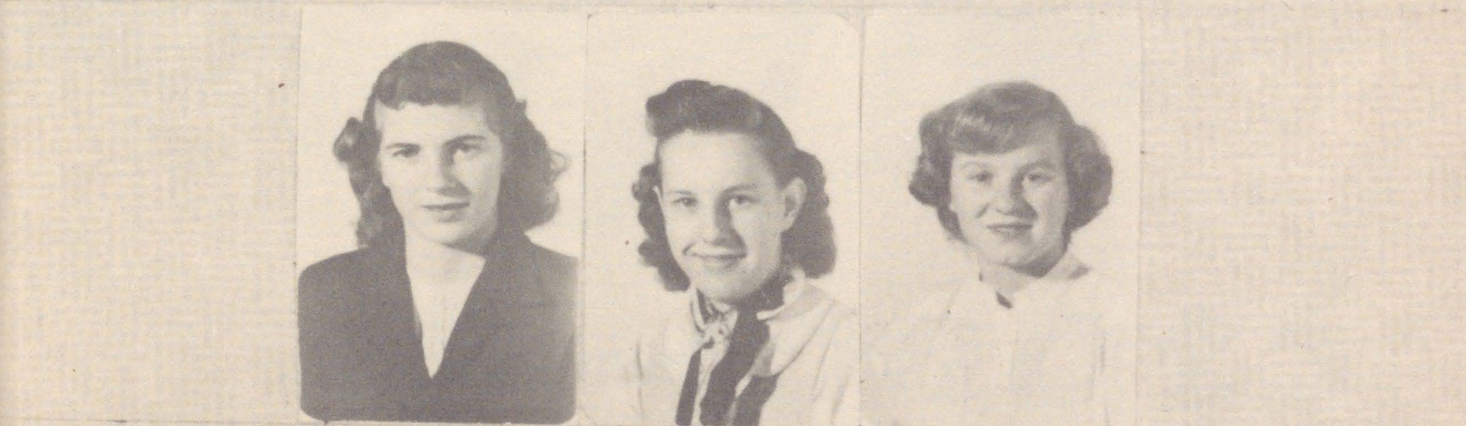
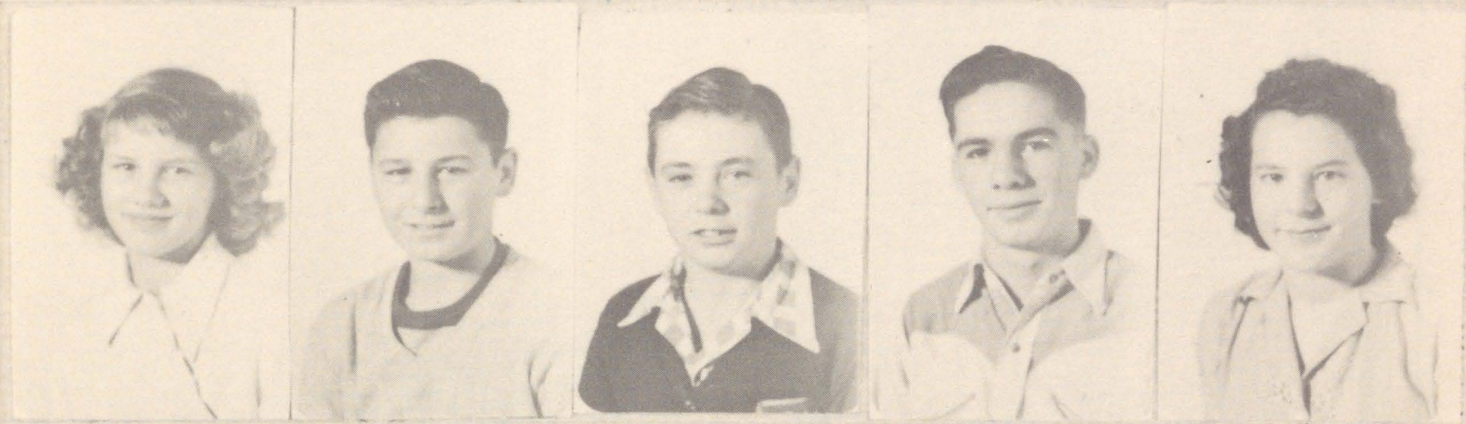
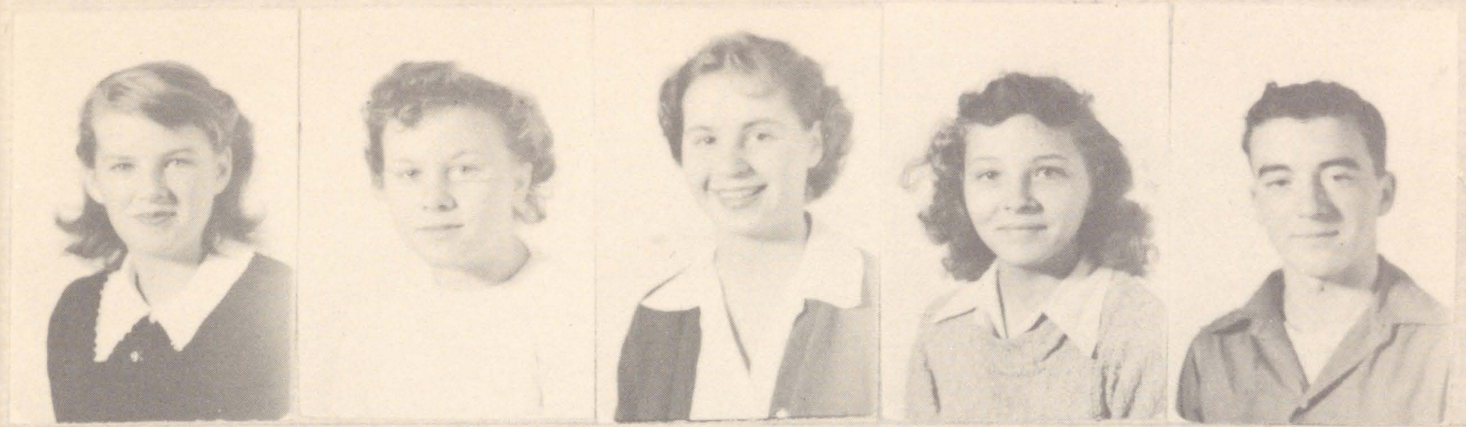
Red hearts for the girls, and white hearts for the boys were given at the door, with Valentine names on them. At a special dance the boys and girls were to find their partners with the same name.

Lunch was served at 11:00. We had cocoa and marshmallows, sandwiches, and for dessert we served ice cream and Valentine cupcakes.

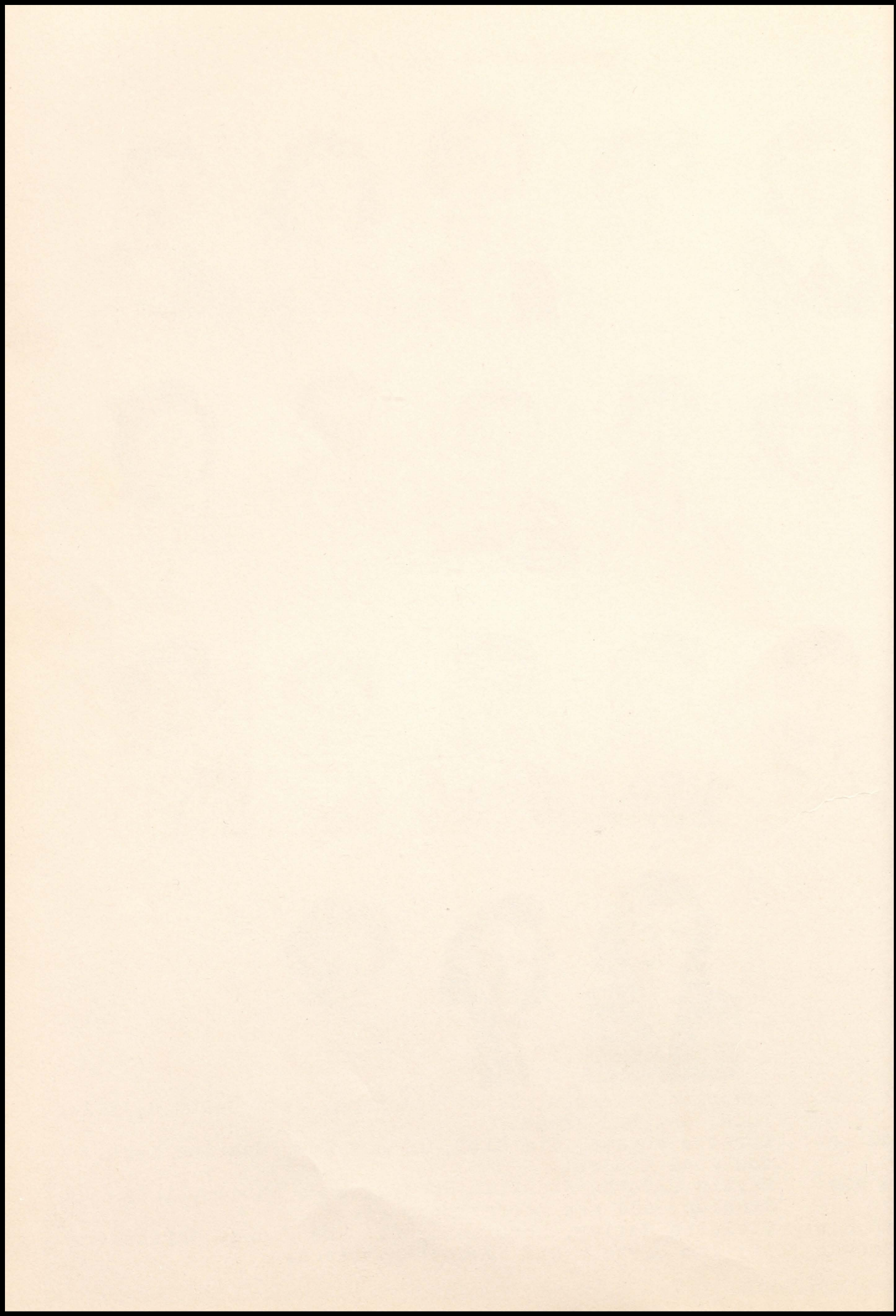
The party turned out to be a big success, due to the help of Mrs. Rubush, and I'm sure everyone would enjoy another one with her as our advisor.

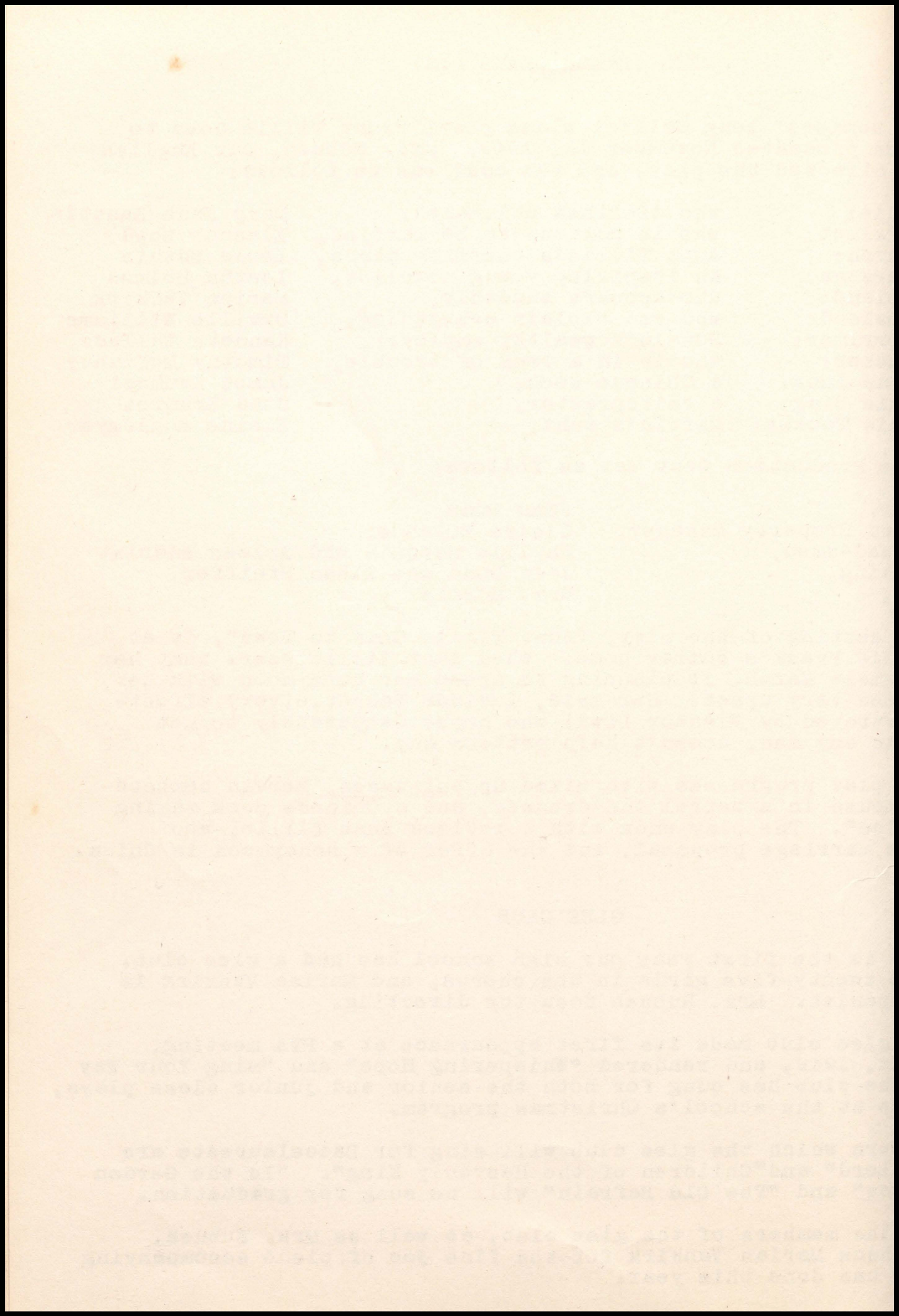
GLEE CLUB
