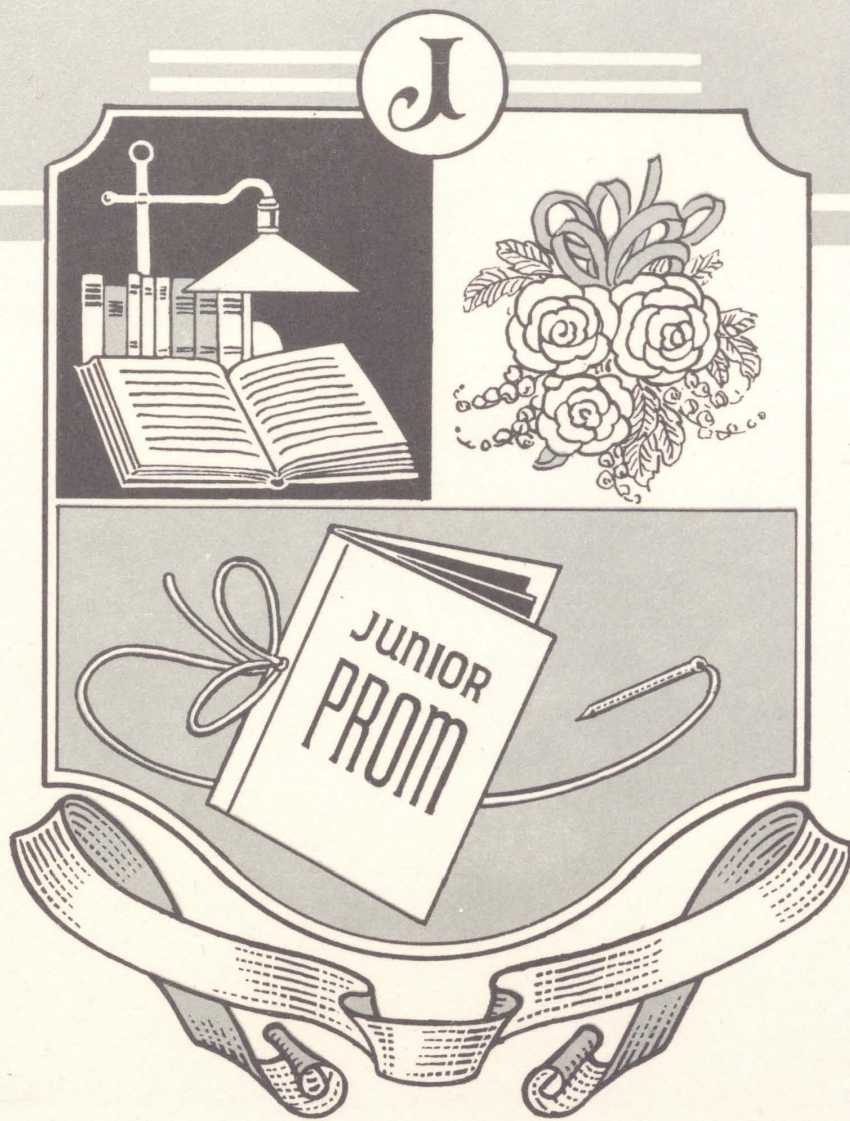
CLASS HISTORY

Various subjects taken by the sophomores were; typing, American history, algebra, English, biology, and bookkeeping.

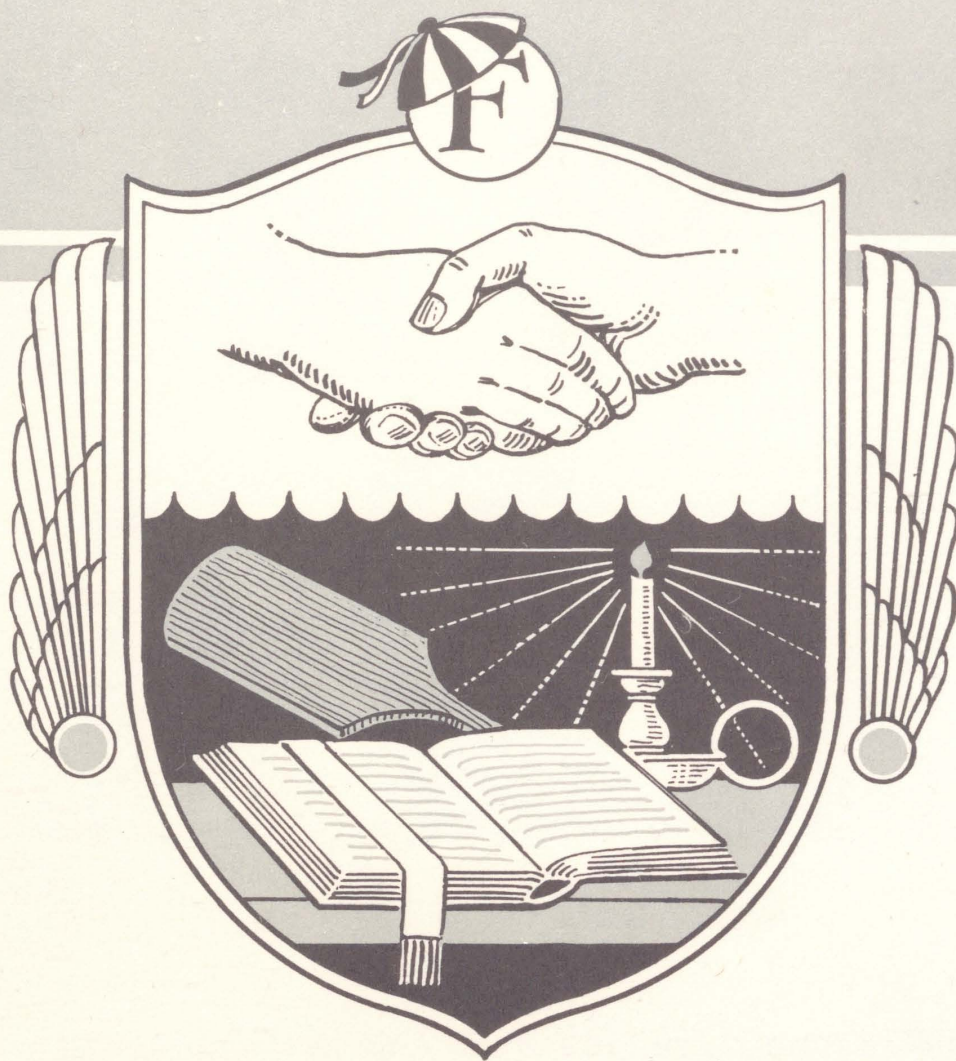
The most important event held by the class was the freshman initiation and the party.

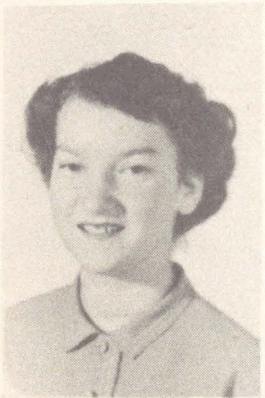

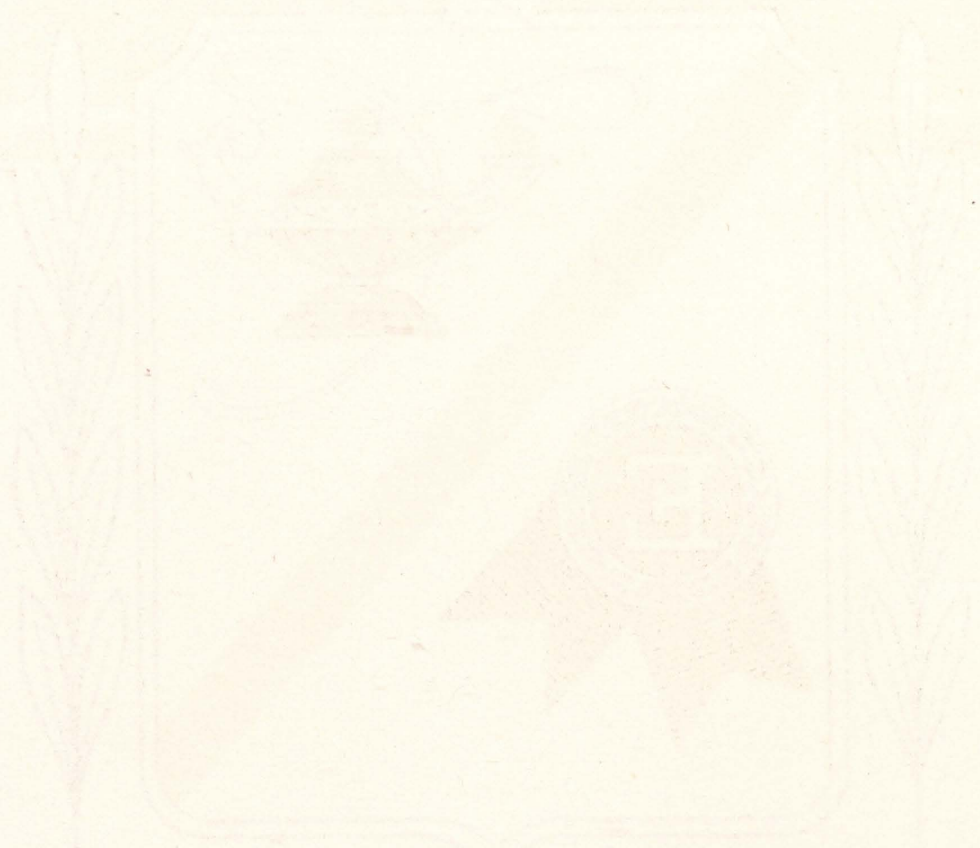

VALEDICTORIAN

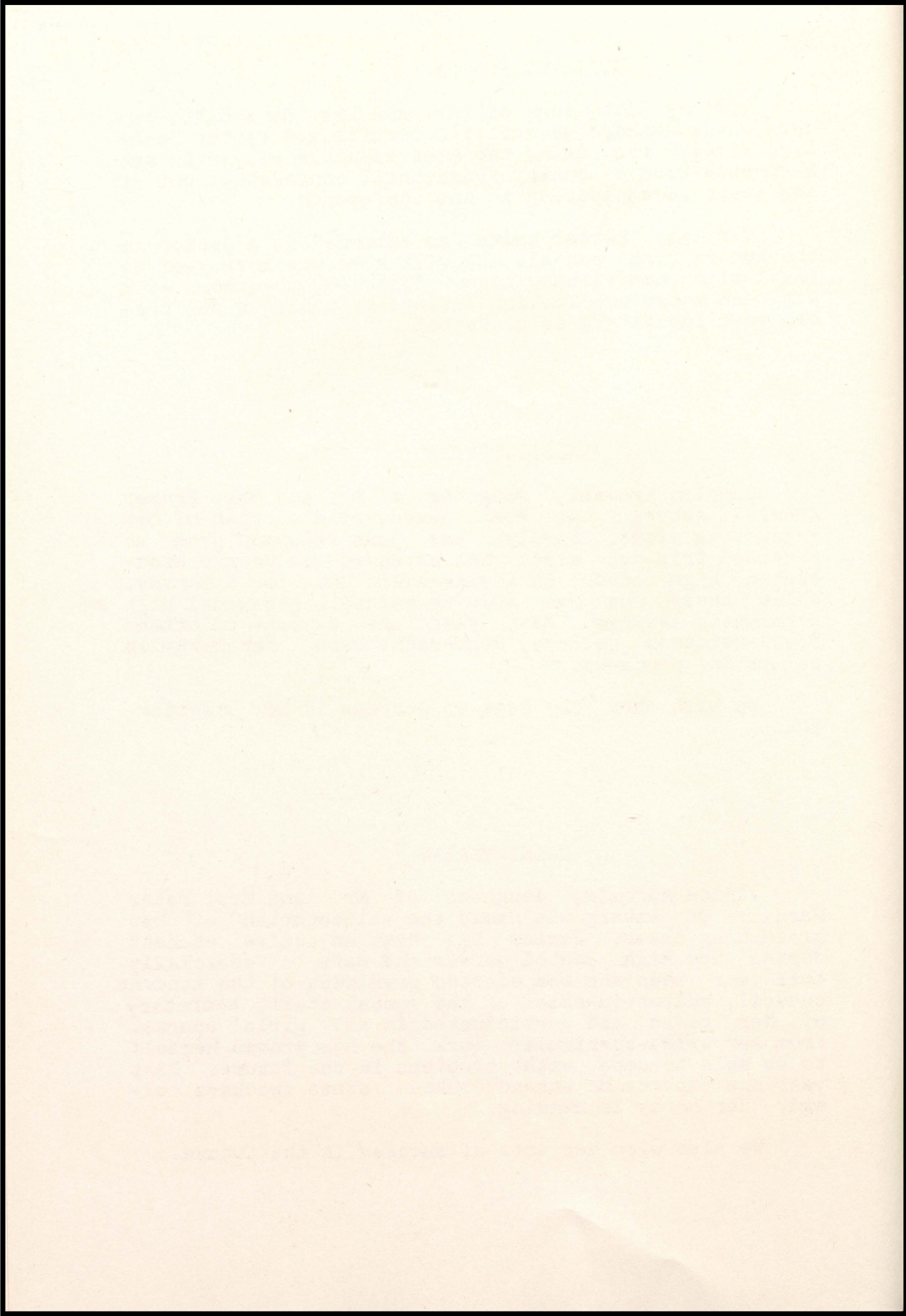

We also wish her lots of success in the future.

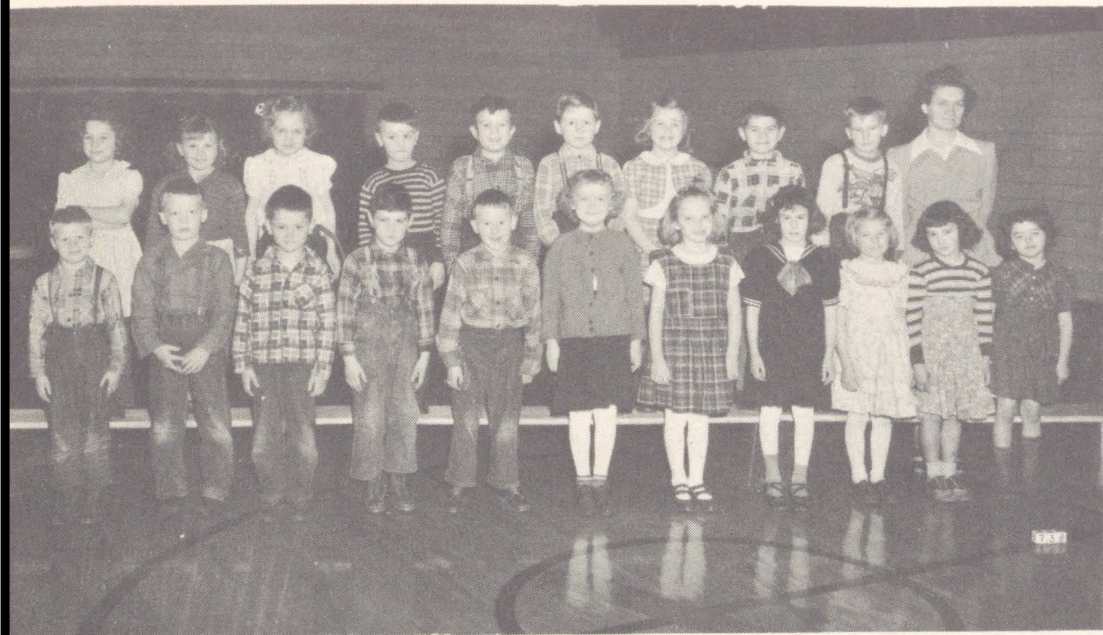

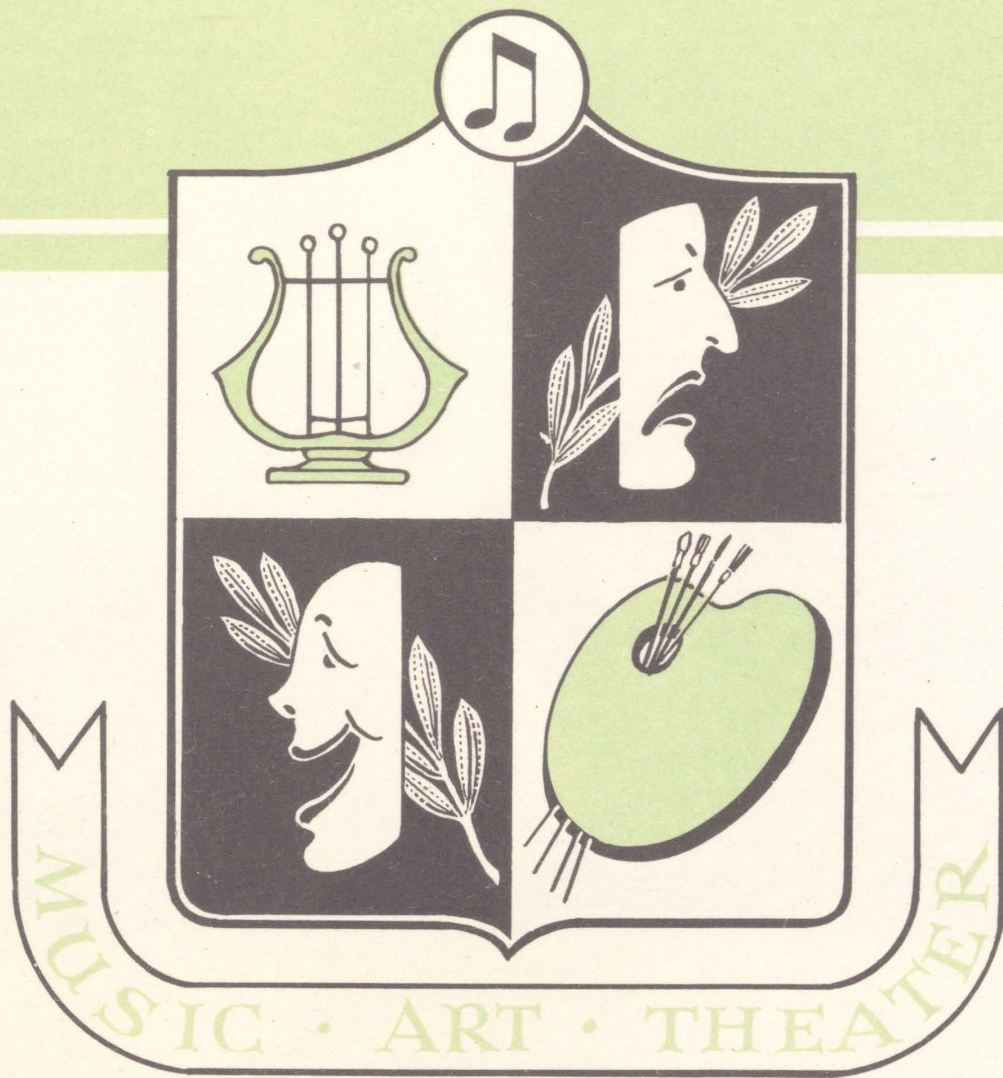
BASKETBALL SEASON

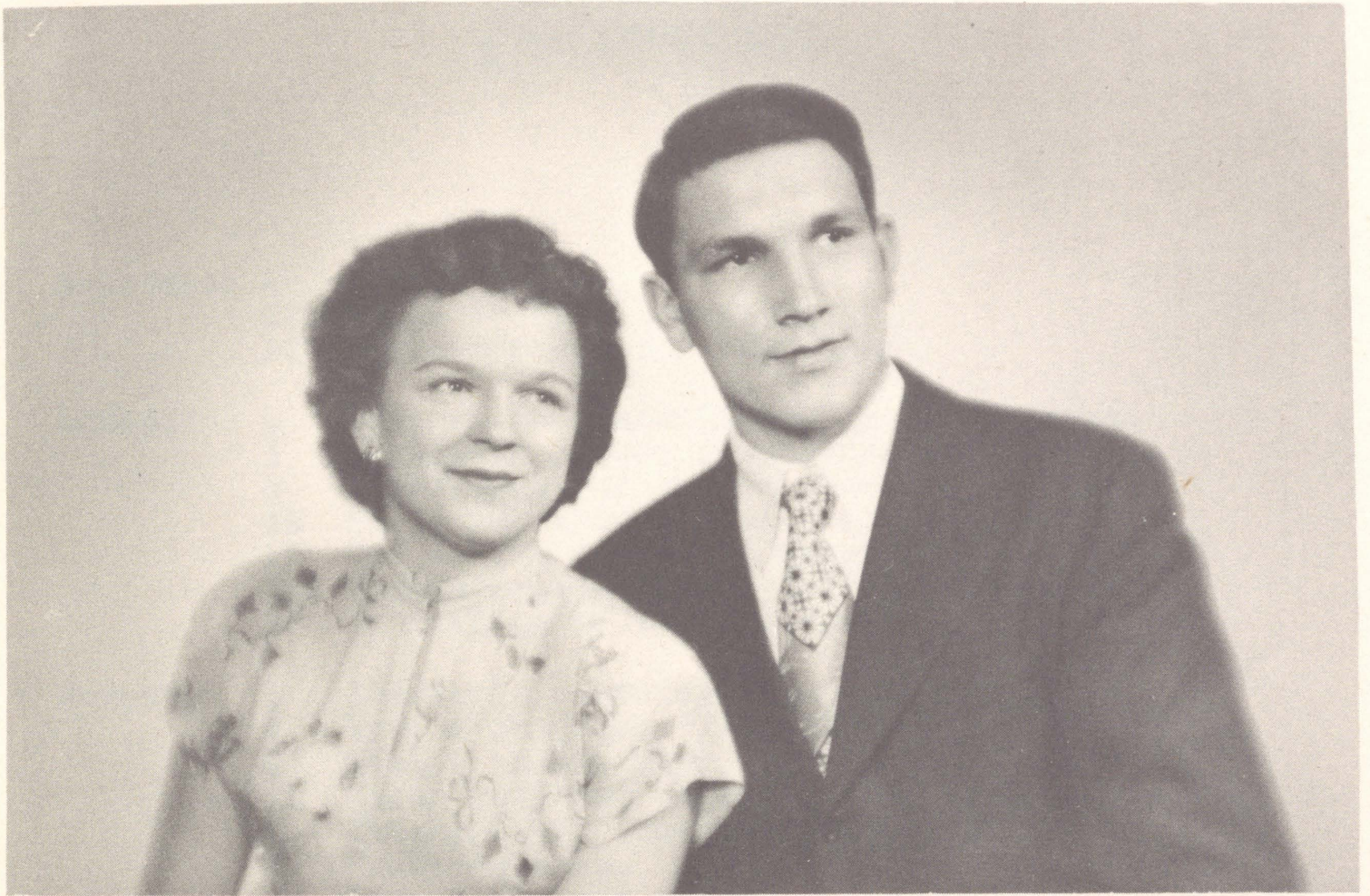
At the close of the season some of the boys went to Madison to see the state championship game. The players all did a fine job considering the number of boys we have in high school.

Stardust was the theme which was carried out by a deep blue sky with many stars. Four huge stars made a still more vivid scene.

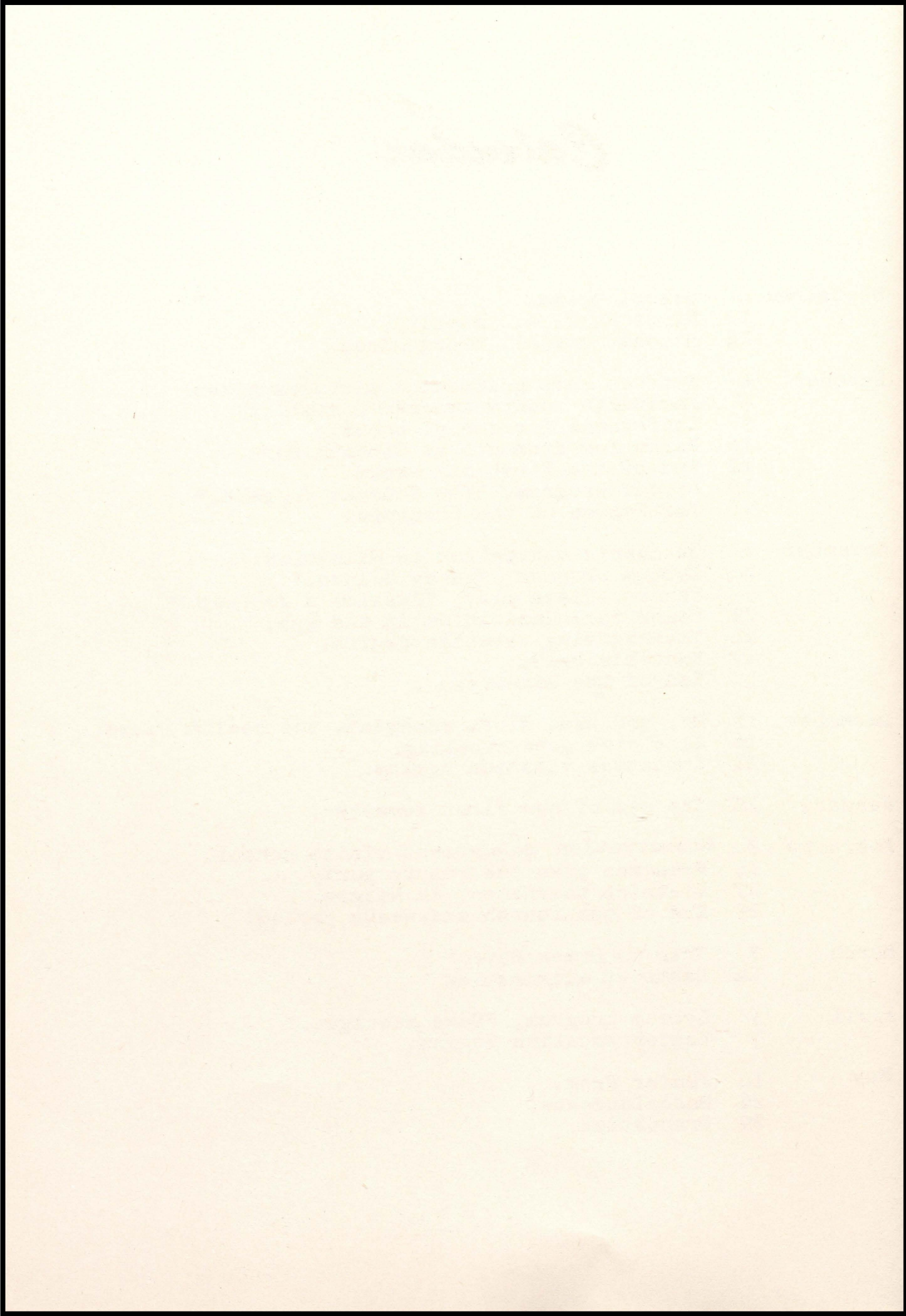
